### YAMHILL COUNTY POW WOW AMERICAN LEGION HELD HERE

The American Legion pow wow, which is the county council of American Legion posts in this county, met here last Friday evening in a business and social meeting which proved to be a very pleasant affair. ### TOO EARLY SPECIALIZATION RUINS MANY CAREERS

"The trained man, the specialized man, is the most unfortunate of men. The world leaves him behind and he loses his power of overtaking it. Versatility, alert adaptability—these are our urgent needs."

The foregoing statement of B. M. Clark, Jr., and as a part of an article appearing in Industrial Management, set out a part of a living truth which should be flaunted in the face of every parent in America.

It is not specialized training, but early specialized training and merely that which does the mischief. "Know one thing, and know it well," is another maxim of education which has been especially overworked during recent years. And if you trace this fallacy to its origin you will find some commercial interest rather than true education as the motive.

The boy who goes directly out of the elementary school without the habit of reading, thinking, and acting on his own initiative and into some mechanical and specialized occupation—that boy is usually doomed to the life of a nonentity. He may in time accumulate some money or some property, but the fates are against him. He will probably never be able to think or act in terms of the large and significant movement of human society.

However the method of relief from the blight of soul suffering from early specialization is fairly clear and very reliable. It is late specialization. First generalize; then specialize. Give your child a broad, general course of training, and he will be far more likely to find in due time his own specialty.

It is not because he knows more about one thing that the high school graduate has such a tremendous advantage over the grammar-grade quitter, it is because he knows a little about many more things. In other words, it is his versatility and his lack of a specialty that tends to save the former from the life of a mere grind.

Train your child for variety and adaptability. Give them first a broad general course, and thus furnish the judgement something to work upon and the interest in a true vocation time to ripen from within. Then he will leap with joy and assurance of success toward his specialty.

### PRIZES OFFERED IN NEAR EAST ESSAY CONTEST

The old reliable "beyond the Alps lies Italy" bids fair this year to find a rival in "beyond the Mediterranean lies the Near East," as a subject for high school essays and orations, since the announcement of cash prizes of \$2000 offered by the Hon. Henry Morgenthau for essays and orations on "some phase of the present political, social, educational or industrial conditions in the 'Near East'" has gone broadcast throughout the land.

Briefly stated the plan is this: Through the generosity of Mr. Morgenthau, former ambassador to Turkey, \$2000 has been placed at the disposal of the Near East Relief to be awarded in prizes for orations and essays actually delivered or read at a public function concerning present day problems in the Near East. Three national prizes are offered—\$500, \$200, and \$100; and in each state, or group of states considered as one, a first, second and third prize of \$15, \$10, and \$5 will be awarded.

The orations and essays entered in each state contest will be passed upon by a state committee, and the national prize winners chosen from among the state prize winners by a national committee consisting of Albert Shaw, editor of the Review of Reviews; Lawrence Abbott, editor of the Outlook, and N. L. Englehardt, professor of education in Columbia University.

Marshall Dana, editor of the Oregon Journal; R. F. Scholz, president of Reed College, Portland; Walter G. Gleason, grand keeper of records and seals, Knights of Pythias; and Miss Margaret Reid, instructor of History, Jefferson high school, Portland, make up the Oregon Committee.

Full information concerning the contest is in the hands of the superintendent of schools or the high school principal. All essays and orations must be sent in to Miss Margaret Reid, secretary, 613 Stock Exchange building, Portland, by June first.
