"All the leading scientists accept Darwin's hypothesis?"

Is this true? If so, name them, with the proofs, and quotations. It is not true, however. Darwin's theory was at one time accepted as a "working theory" by many, among them Huxley, Spencer, Tyndall, Virchow, Meunier and Haeckel. But when Tyndall's experiments failed to prove spontaneous generation, and when Mendel established the fact that acquired characteristics are not perpetuated, Darwinism began to collapse; Herbert Spencer saying that if Mendel's conclusions were correct, then Darwin's theory could not stand; and he afterwards accepted them as correct.
Mirchow, one of the foremost chemists of the globe, said of evolution, "It is all nonsense. It cannot be proved by science that man descends from the ape or any other animal.... All real scientific knowledge has proceeded in the opposite direction.... The middle link has not been found and never will be." All of which is quite generally agreed in.

Tyndall afterward said "The doctrine is utterly discredited."

Huxley wrote that where species cross, their product is itself infertile, instead of creating a new species.

Professor Mivart speaking of Darwinism said, "I cannot call it anything but a puerile hypothesis."
Sir David Brewster: "We have absolute proof of the immutability of species."

Science is not guessing but knowledge, and there is not a single known fact in all science upon which to base the theory of one species being produced from another and different species.
Darwin himself recognized in later years the weakness of his theory. Everybody ought to hear these words of his: "I was a young man with unformed ideas. I threw out queries, suggestions, wondering all the time over everything, and to my astonishment the ideas took like wildfire; people made a religion of them."
Some such people still exist, and making a religion and a science of them. Simply tell such persons there is no known proof whatever of their improbable and debasing theory.
