The doctor was intensely interested in this bit of local history. He could not say enough for Herbert Hoover and the esteem in which he is held abroad. They call him a miracle worker and he is looked upon with reverence and love. Dr. Gero, who is a doctor of political economy, is traveling through various countries, making an exhaustive study of economic conditions.
