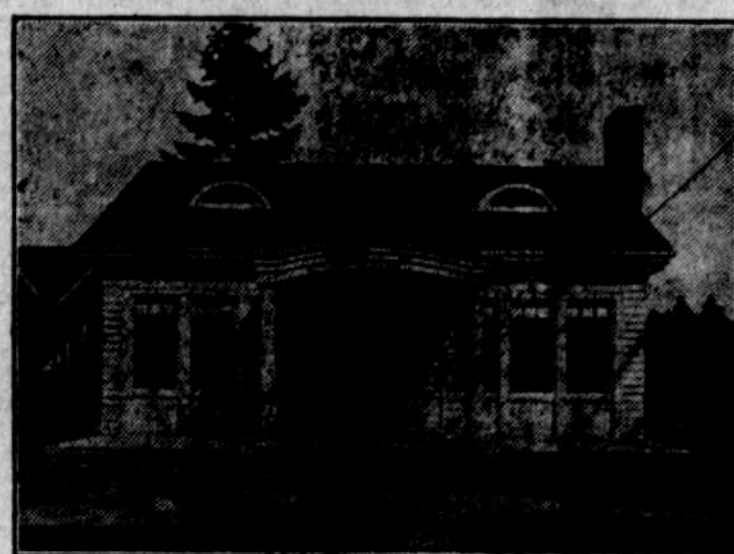

TOO MANY GOWNS

Japanese Women Favor Western Simplicity in Dress.

Women's time is beginning to have a value even the orient. For centuries Japanese women have been slaves to countless costumes, one for every occasion and all subject to complete ripping and remaking after each washing or cleaning. Now, according to Mme. Inouye, the youthful dean of women at the University of Tokio, Japanese women are rebelling against this needless waste of time and energy, says the New York World.

"Men in Japan have already adopted European dress and women are following their lead," said Dean Inouye. "Many girls threaten to leave home rather than needlessly devote the entire time to the ripping and remaking of native costumes."

In Japan there is a special cloth that must be worn for different oc-

casions. If a woman attends a wedding, only a certain textile is permissible. If a friend dies, to the funeral another must be worn, and so on indefinitely. It is from all of this that the Japanese women want to be released.

Dean Inouye was clad in a trim tailor-made suit.

"Domestic independence is much more frequent now for women," she continued. "Formerly the father-in-law dominated the home. In a son's marriage the tendency now is to separate and establish homes of their own. Today the wife has a much better time."

"There a few old maids in Japan," she concluded. "While freedom of choice in a husband is gaining ground, marriage among women is almost universal. Divorces are still rare. If divorced, a teacher loses her rank. We do not think that a divorced woman could educate others. If well balanced we must be happy in the family. Educated women are

supposed to have that art of keeping the family together."

Russian Potato Salad

Dice enough cold boiled potatoes to fill three cups. Chop fine enough onion with half a pepper to fill one cup. Drain a can of sardines, skin, bone and flake them fine. Add a bud of garlic chopped fine to a half cupful of French dressing. Cut fine the white center of a small head of chicory. Toss together the potato, onion, fish and chicory, add the dressing, dust with paprika, and let stand to flavor 20 minutes. Serve in small white cabbage leaves garnished with pickled onions.
