Few people seem to have thought out vividly the scenes of the Savior's crucifixion, which we have been recently remembering somewhat superficially. A careful retracing of these scenes should be often made.

After the quiet supper when He said, "This do in remembrance of Me," instituting the holy communion and charging His church to keep it up "till He comes," as the church has done in all ages; and after the midnight betrayal in the garden, where in the bloody sweat He endured His final preparation for the ordeal before Him, finally He is confronted by absolutely all of the great religious leaders of the nation, desperately plotting in the darkness of night to put Him to death, and was brought before the governor as a malefactor, to be sentenced. Can we picture that scene? His patient quietness, His dignity, provoking to the brutal soldiery and servile populace; the overwhelming outcries for His crucifixion; the awful oath, "His blood be upon us and on our children;" and then He is led away with horrid solemnity to be whipped and scourged. We see Him finally stood up in the spot where the agony was to be inflicted, stripped of His outer garments that the quivering flesh might be exposed to the fearful blows that sometimes tore away bits of the body and scattered all about the blood of the victim. If He endured all this for us, we ought to retrace it all in loving, sympathizing thought, realizing that it was all for our sins; and the awful humiliation and agonies of the cross, where they laid Him down and nailed Him, as the Lamb of God, atoning for our sins.

He has three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Eva Hamley, the eldest, lives in Arkansas City, Kansas; Mrs. Stella Postle lives in Lafayette, Oregon, and Mrs. Daisy Laughlin of Newberg, and Fred Case, of Loxley, Alabama.

He united with the Congregational church in 1896. He was a kind and loving husband and father.
