LEGION NEWS

Through donation work by the members of the post and with the aid of teams furnished free, the Ray Johnson post of Redmond is laying its foundation for the swimming tank. Construction of the clubhouse will be started shortly.

The Umatilla county council of the American Legion has been organized at Pendleton. The council is composed of the seven posts in the district comprising the cities of Stanfield, Hermiston, Milton, Pendleton, Athena-Weston, Pilot Rock. Plans for a joint celebration of Amistice Day and a county convention of the legion men in the district, were made. A naturalization and alien survey will be taken and cooperation of posts in all its activities will be endeavored.

Hanging in the room which Marshal Foch of France has reserved in his home for the thousands of presents he received while touring the United States under the auspices of the American Legion are the keys to eleven of America's largest cities. All the gifts which America bestowed on the Marshal are in his "American Room" except the famous Montana bobcat, which now paces a cage in the Paris zoological gardens.

Time has so thinned the ranks of the G. A. R. at St. Cloud, Minn., that the few remaining members have voted to disband and turn over to the American Legion the responsibility of observing Memorial and other days on which the boys of '61 have honored their dead comrades for more than half a century.

Madras American Legion post will build a home for use of the post and citizens of the community. At a meeting of the post to discuss this matter one thousand dollars was immediately pledged by the membership. Construction on the home will be started shortly.

North Bend post American Legion will soon erect a \$20,000 modern home. The building as planned by the architects is estimated to cost \$17,000 and the grounds have already cost \$2800. The post will be incorporated and shares of stock will be issued to raise funds to put up the building.

A show which netted the Springfield Legion post over \$150, included five reels of movies, "The Rookies' Return," a black face act, a night with the ghosts, and an exhibition of rope climbing. The entertainment concluded with a pie eating contest by the members of the post.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

N. H. S. will play Amity here on Friday of this week and McMinnville at this place on Wednesday of next week. These should be good games as several of the old players who have not been out previously are now coming out to practice and these with the best of those who have been playing should make a snappy team for Newberg.

The high school is planning for a track team this year and to draw out the best material for this team an interclass meet will be held at the high school grounds Thursday afternoon of this week. Letters have been received from Linfield College and Albany College regarding an interscholastic meet to be held at each of these institutions later in the season. The meet at McMinnville will be on Saturday, May 13, and that at Albany on Saturday, May 20. This only leaves three weeks for Newberg to get a team in shape but at least this will give the local high school a start for next year. Chet Newlin has been elected track manager.

FARM POINTERS

Full Stand of Corn Best

Nothing is so sure to cut down the yield of corn as a poor stand. Few Oregon corn fields have 85 per cent of a stand at harvest time. Corn should be checked over if the land is weedy, otherwise it may be drilled in.

Green Feed Helms Chicks

Mineral elements in green feed seem to have a beneficial effect on the growth of young chicks. It also furnishes bulk to add to the more concentrated feed. Lawn clippings, finely chopped kale, cabbage leaves, or lettuce answers the purpose very well. Feed the chicks all they will eat of this material even when they are only a week old.

Spotted Beetles Arrive

The western twelve-spotted cucumber beetle, one of the most destructive and general feeders in the garden, is making its appearance now. A powder made of sifted wood ashes, one part, and sifted arsenate of lead one part, dusted lightly over the young plants will do much to protect them from early injury. No one treatment will suffice against this pest, however. A well prepared seed bed and an excess of planted seed are measures of some value. The beetles are particularly fond of beans and squash, hence a few hills of these scattered around form an excellent trap crop.

Cows Need Soiling Crops

Plan now for the soiling crops for the dairy cows as there will be a time this fall, when supplementary green feed will be needed. A succession of plantings should be arranged ten days to two weeks apart as this will keep a supply of fresh green feed on hand at all times. O. A. C. experiment station.

BOTHILDA M. NONKEN

Mrs. Bothilda Maria Nonken was born October 29, 1835, in Denmark, and died in Newberg, Oregon, April 20, 1922, aged 86 years, 5 months, and 21 days. She was united in marriage to Jens Lauritsen in 1865, to which union were born four children, all of whom are deceased. She married in 1879, J. D. Nonken in Germany. They came to America about 30 years ago and settled first in Kansas, later moving to Roseburg, Oregon, thence to Oakland, California, and finally to Newberg, Oregon, in which place her husband died in 1901. Deceased is survived by one grandchild, Mrs. Hazel Winters of Parrett Mountain, and by one great-grandchild, Arbelline Winters, also several step-children, grand children and great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Nonken was well known to many residents of Newberg and greatly respected, being familiarly known as "Grandma" Nonken. She was a faithful believer and follower of Jesus Christ, and was at the time of her death a member of the Christian church of this place. Funeral services were held from the Christian church directed by Messrs. Phillips and Sickafoose. Mr. Phillips spoke a glowing tribute to her long, useful and splendid life, emphasizing particularly her faithfulness to the work of the church. "Today," he said, "we mourn the loss of one we had learned to love, but our loss is her gain, for she rests from her labors." Today earth is poorer in the life gone, but heaven is richer in the homecoming of a saint and "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints."

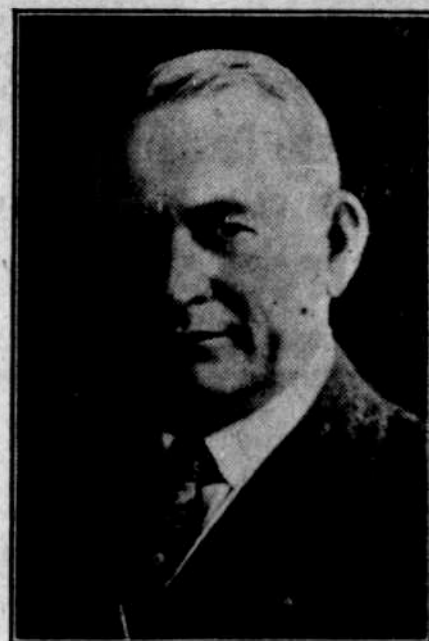
TO THE BUSINESS MEN OF NEWBERG
