For the motorist who enjoys a short trip in the cool of the evening or on a Sunday afternoon, there is probably no more scenic or more enjoyable trip in this vicinity than that offered by the new mountain road from Springbrook up over the east end of Chehalis mountain past the Burke place. Here one sees mountain scenery and enjoys a fine stretch of road winding up through the orchards and berry patches and then one gets glimpses of the valley at frequent intervals which are not surpassed anywhere in the entire country for scenic beauty and panoramic effect. From the top of the mountain one can look back over the entire valley and then if one chooses, he may drive on over the succeeding ridge and get another panorama of the valley beyond. It is a wonderful sight and splendid short trip. Last Sunday the Burke pear orchard as well as numerous other orchards on the mountain were in bloom and made a very beautiful picture. There are many cool retreats along the way and pretty picnic spots which so far the Newberg people have not come to appreciate to their full, but which we predict will become more popular as people become better acquainted with them.

Now that the hot season is approaching, there is always a great tendency to use city water to excess. Sprinkling and garden usage requires a great deal more water than during winter weather, while evaporation is greater and domestic usage is more general. Kuhn Loses Damage Suit

The action for damages filed by Fred Kuhn vs. M. E. Reitzel, W. H. Lott, W. H. Barendrick et al resulted in a nonsuit as to defendants Reitzel and Cook, and a verdict for defendant Lott and Barendrick. The plaintiff was granted 60 days in which to prepare, serve and lodge bills of exceptions. The plaintiff alleged that he was burned by a hot water bottle while he underwent an operation at the McMinnville hospital.

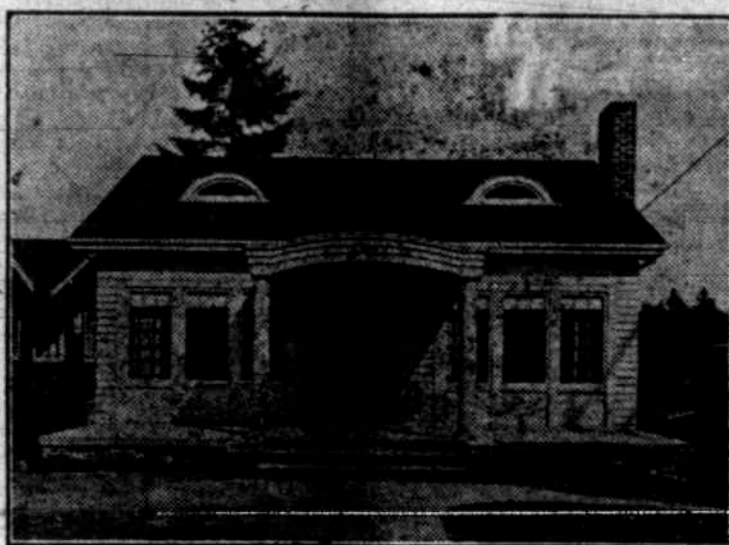
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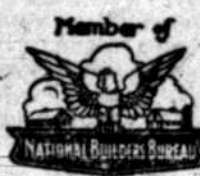
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
