WHY JOIN THE CHURCH?

1. I ought to belong to the church because I ought to be better than I am. Henry Ward Beecher once said, "The church is not a gallery for the exhibition of eminent Christians, but a school for the education of imperfect ones."

2. I ought to belong to the church because of what I can give it and do through it as well as because of what I may get out of it. The church is not a dormitory for sleepers; it is an institution of workers; it is not a camp, it is a front line trench.

3. I ought to belong to the church because every man ought to pay his debts and do his share toward discharging the obligations of society. The church has not only been the bearer of the good news of personal salvation; it has been and it is the supreme uplifting and conserving agency without which, "Civilization would lapse into barbarism and press its way to perdition."

4. I ought to belong to the church because of memories; memories of things I can never forget; memories of faces that will never fade; memories of vows that are the glory of youth.

5. I ought to belong to the church because of hope; hope that lives when promises are dead; hope that paves the way for progress; hope that visions peace and social justice; hope for time, and hope for eternity the great hope that casts its anchor behind Jesus Christ.

6. I ought to belong to the church because of the strong men in it who need reinforcing; the weak men in it who need reinforcing; the men in it who need encouraging; the rascals in it who need rebuking. If I say that I am not good enough, my humility recommends me. If I sit in the seat of the scornful my inactivity condemns me.

7. I ought to belong to the church, but not until I am ready to join a going concern; not until I am willing to become an active partner with Jesus Christ.

OBITUARY

Frederick William St. Clair was born in St. Clair county, Michigan, August 16, 1856, and died at his farm in the Lad Hill district near Newberg, Oregon, May 11, 1922, aged 65 years, 8 months and 25 days. He was united in marriage with Miss Chloe Clark in Orleans, Iowa county, Michigan on February 29, 1880. To this union were born ten children, nine of whom, with the widow, survive him. He came to Oregon in 1889 and located on a farm at Lad Hill where he lived until his death. He became a member of the Church of Christ on January 27, 1896. He had been in poor health for the past five years, suffering from heart trouble and cancer. Funeral services were conducted from the home last Saturday afternoon, Rev. K. H. Sickafosse officiating and interment followed at Pleasant Hill.

Stuffed Roast Goose

Select a young and tender goose, scrub it clean, dress carefully, cut out the neck to make a French breast, and bone the legs, then draw them inside. Make a light bread and onion stuffing, using plenty of seasoning and butter. Stuff the goose, make the breast smooth and sew up the apron. Dust with pepper and salt and squeeze over all the juice of a lemon. As the bird cooks, baste frequently and turn over once or twice. Pierce the skin on the back and under the wings so as to liberate the surplus fat, then skin will cook brown and crisp instead of being greasy and soft.

May Cultivate Rubber Plant

In the southern part of Arizona the wild rubber plant grows abundantly and may be cultivated in a large way if present experiments prove that from it a marketable quality of crude rubber may be extracted.
