A reader of the Graphic writes a courteous criticism of the word Sabbath, used in these notes. He says: "Why not cut out in church notices, the title of 'Sabbath' for our Sunday services, and substitute 'Lord's Day'?" I can find no reference in the Bible to a christian sabbath, and certainly the Jewish sabbath is obsolete.

The word sabbath is very precious to some of us who were raised to observe the day as a fulfillment of the fourth commandment. The ex-

pression The Lord's Day is a precious one too, and used in the Bible of the day observed as a sabbath since the time of our Lord's resurrection. Both expressions are cherished by many eminently spiritual people. One friend of mine never used the word Sunday because it was distasteful to him.

It is perhaps best not to be too insistent in such matters; but let each brother use what terms he prefers, and are dear to him, not for a moment supposing that any discourtesy is intended to fellow-Christians.

The sheriffs of the United States in a convention at Denver, Colorado, some years ago adopted the following resolution: "Resolved that it is the sense of this convention that the city councils of all cities, should enact and enforce the curfew ordinance with as much promptness as possible."

If the curfew prevents crime elsewhere, why not with us?
