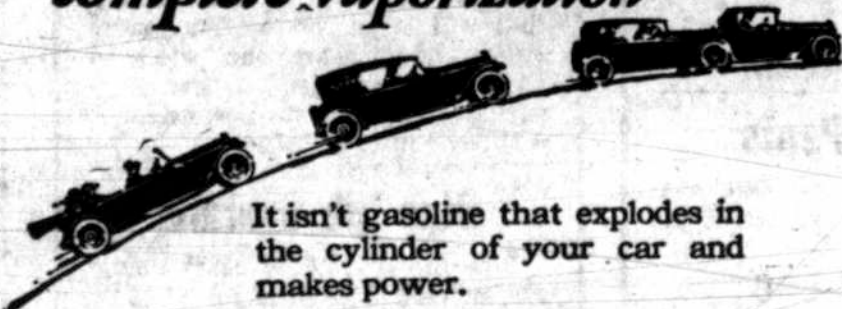

THE UNIVERSAL BOOK

Someone has said that this is a "Bible starved nation." Amid a multitude of bibles we are not conversant with it as we should be. And yet this book demands our attention because of its claims. It claims to be the word of God. Its friends must ever contend for this, as it is but the product of man. It should have been relegated to the dust heap years ago with the apparent advance in knowledge, yet it stands unsurpassed by any class of book today, in fact it is really and truly "The Universal Book." It is the one book adapted to all ages. It is particularly a child's book as evidenced by the enthusiasm with which the stories of baby Moses and boy Jesus are always received by the little ones. Its appeal is ever forceful to the young woman who can find in the book of Ruth a love story never equalled in literature. The young man in search for heroes and deeds of valor may always be satisfied by the stories of David and Joshua, whilst his search for the ideal is rewarded in the recorded histories of Daniel and Jesus. It must ever be a mother's book for it everywhere exalts woman and sanctifies motherhood, and fathers who desire that wisdom without which they cannot form the necessary sound judgments, will find within its pages the soundest of counsel by the wisest of men.

Not only is it for all ages but all classes of society may be reached by it for it has ever transformed the working man, so that a miner under its influence becomes Luther, the reformer, whilst Bunyan, the tinker, inspired by its message, becomes the author of the immortal "Pilgrim's Progress." It has proved the enlightenment of business and professional men and without it Calvin, the attorney, would not have become Calvin the theologian. To it Moody owed his change from the business of shoe salesman to that of world wide evangelist.

Philosophers have confessed their indebtedness to it, for while Carlyle calls the book of Job the world's greatest piece of literature, Webster admits that whatever eloquence there was in him was because he learned the scriptures at his mother's knee. The Bible has proved to be the guide of the world's greatest statesmen. Lincoln memorized many portions of it. Garfield taught its truths in Hiram college and preached its message from many pulpits. Lloyd George of England is following in the footsteps of Gladstone who said, "My only hope for the world is in bringing the human mind into contact with divine revelation" and who relied implicitly upon what he termed "the impregnable rock of holy scripture."

The diversity of this wonderful book is further emphasized in that it meets the needs of all mental conditions of man. Is he filled with joy or a victor in the strife, the psalms of thanksgiving will enable him to express his exuberance and provide paens fitted only for the victorious. Has sorrow and temptation entered his life, the words of comfort and cheer, the promises of a loving heavenly Father, the assurances of an Almighty Savior, will prove to be the balm of Gilead, and in the hour of death this book will always be, as said Sir Walter Scott, "the only bulk for a dying man."

In seasons of doubt "the word of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes," whilst in times of ignorance and spiritual darkness it will be found "sure, making wise the simple," and an ever trusty "lamp unto the feet."

The universality of this divine volume is seen in its adaptability to all nations and races. The Koran will ever remain the religious book of the Mohammedans only. The Sanscrit will be bounded by Hinduism and the Talmud will never appeal to any but Jews, but the Bible knows no race boundary, it is a world wide book. It is read in 500 different languages today and thus reaches seven-tenths of the world's population. It is in this respect a world wide favorite as has been the experience of no other work or work. The classical writings of Homer have been translated into twenty languages. Shakespeare's illustrious works are to be found in thirty-three tongues. Tolstol's altruistic treatises are read by at least the same number of distinct races, whilst the immortal "Pilgrim's Progress" alone approaches within a distance worthy of consideration of that of the Bible for it has been translated into 111 languages.

What does such a record bespeak? When Gutenberg in 1450 gave to the world the first printing press, with movable type, no book was considered more worthy or more in popular demand than the Bible, so that it was the first book to issue from his press. Today, despite the rapid advance of printing and the almost innumerable books printed upon every other topic under the sun, it easily holds first place. Dickens, much in demand as have been his works, can only boast a sale of forty-four million. In an age craving for novels that touch life at every point, the demand for Harold Bell Wright's books is met in an aggregate sale of seven million copies. These figures pale into insignificance when compared with the number of copies of the Bible for only one year. 1921 showed a total distribution of this universal book amounting to eighteen million copies, a distribution which excelled the combined output of the 100 best sellers on the market. For 1900 years this book has led all others and has provided the source of inspiration for hundreds of thousands of great works by the greatest of men.

The Bible is not a text book upon the sciences, altho its pages contain worthy the consideration of the scientist. It is not a treatise on the arts although it reveals many truths concerning them. Its message is a universal one. Its message is a divine one. Its message is a vital one. It is God's word to man regarding his origin, his shame, his salvation and his destiny. It deals not in hypoth-

eses and theories, but in lives and facts. It reveals life, it bristles with life, and this vitality is the secret of its penetrative universality for verily the "word of God is living and active" and sharper than any two-edged knife. Its intense vitality awakens the interest of the child, it arouses the latent spirituality of youth, and confirms and ennobles that of the aged. Its message speaks encouragement to the weak and rejoices the strong. It ever makes wise the simple and enlightens the wise. It reveals God to all its readers and as a mirror reflects one to himself. It is the "word of God which liveth and abideth forever." God's book to all his creatures and should find a place in the hearts and lives of all until the "earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Lord."
