Drouth, Cold Cause Trouble

Many of the orchard troubles causing concern to growers this spring are of physiological nature and not caused by disease. The unusually dry summer and fall last year followed by a severe winter greatly interfered with root growth that ordinarily occurs during the dormant season. The result has been various disorders which appear at first sight to be disease.
