#### HOW CAN THEY DO IT?

The roar of the lion and the scream of the leopard have gone with the passing of the Howe's circus, which showed here last Saturday. True this was not a show to class itself with Ringling Bros. or Barnum & Bailey, but even so nearly everyone who saw the performances here felt that the circus people endeavored to give them the worth of their money. Some of the animal acts were quite good and the work of the lion tamer in the final act in which six mammoth African lions (advertised 28) were kept in a continual roar, was thrilling enough for almost anyone. The clowns pulled some old stuff and some not quite so old; the educated horses danced and pranced and the dogs walked wires, rolled over and otherwise showed evidence of being trained. But the thing at which we marvel most regarding every circus which we have ever seen is that they can advertise to have three big rings and two steel arenas and two stages and then only show two rings, one steel arena and no stage at all. Why do the American people let them get away with such a deal? If a local merchant advertised to sell four boxes of strawberries for 25 cents and then only gave his customers three he would hear from them right away, but let a circus come along and advertise all sorts of extravagant things and the public promptly makes due allowance for their claims, pays twice what they advertised to charge and goes away smiling, and telling each other what a good show it was. We're either terribly dense or the general public are woefully gullible.

The circus which showed here last Saturday was no better nor any worse than any other circus in respect to living up to their colored

lithos and newspaper statements. They advertised a two mile long street parade. Probably no persons who read that advertisement ever expected to see any such spectacle and certainly if they did have such expectations they must have been greatly disappointed. They advertised the most gorgeous spectacle ever presented under a tent—a dazzling extravaganza with countless animals and people. This proved to be very largely a repetition of the opening parade or pageant which every circus has and which we have seen excelled many times, with a slight variation in the introduction of a big slipper containing a young lady surrounded by six dancing girls. But after all it was a circus and proved the delight of the boys and girls from six to sixty, and so we forgive them for all their exaggerated advertising and cheerfully pay them fifty cents for the privilege of sitting on a hard board simply because it has a little back to it, rather than be shoved off into one end of the tent where we can't see much.

#### STEALING BICYCLES

Complaint has been made at this office that boys about town are taking bicycles which have been temporarily left by their owners and ridden off and in some cases damaged. This is simply vandalism and should be treated as such. A bicycle is private property and no matter where it is left its ownership remains vested in the original purchaser. The boy or man who will take advantage of the owner's absence to purloin the use of his bicycle will be tempted to do the same with an automobile later on, or with some other property. Such depredations should be watched and any guilty ones should be punished.

The Portland Beavers climbed into third place last week for one day. It's been a long time since the Beavers have been that near the top of the ladder and while they probably do not have a pennant winning team this year, yet they have made a remarkable stride in the right direction and next year should see them as real contenders for the flag.

#### Sunshine Cake

Six eggs, a pinch of salt added to the whites before beating, one-third teaspoonful cream of tartar, two-thirds cup of flour, 1 cup sugar, flavor with the grated rind of 1 lemon or 1 teaspoonful vanilla. Sift, measure and set aside flour and sugar; then sift the flour four times; whip whites to a foam, add cream of tartar and whip until very stiff; add sugar to the yolks and beat; then add the beaten whites and flavoring;
