Ask for Restraining Order

That the proposed power line of the Yamhill Electric company of Newberg to be installed on the road leading out of Dayton and to furnish electricity at Amity will interfere with the transmission of telephonic messages over the grounded circuit of the Yamhill County Mutual telephone company, is alleged in a complaint in the circuit court by the Dayton telephone concern against the power company at Newberg. The Dayton concern alleges that the 11,000 volts to be carried by the electric company's lines will interfere with the telephonic service, and the court is asked to restrain the Newberg company from constructing the proposed line.

Judge Belt on June 3 dissolved the temporary restraining order and dismissed the complaint.
