A very interesting invitation came recently to Mr. Lee, asking him to officiate at the wedding of Miss Ruth Corbett of Corvallis to Mr. Jennings of the Y. M. C. A. of Eugene. CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The interest in the meetings still continues to be fine. The sermons as well as the music are such that people desire to hear them often. Mr. Ross has certainly delivered some splendid and gripping addresses. On Sunday particularly he spoke of Newberg's greatest asset which, he said, was not her wealth or possibilities, but the Bible school. It is the greatest because practically the only place where boys and girls are getting religious education. Because these same boys and girls are to be the America of the future. It is the greatest because it develops the character of the young people; it creates and fixes religious habits. Here they learn to pray and become conversant with the claims of the church and the right of attendance. It discovers talent and introduces the young to Jesus Christ. The church at Newberg has an enviable record in this respect for she has developed and sent forth several into the active ministry. The great need in the Bible schools today, said Mr. Ross, is to study the doctrine and inclination of the pupils and then bring the scriptural truths home into the lives of the young so that they will grip them. The Bible school must be considered in the light of educational principles for it is to teach, not preach, the religion of Jesus Christ. To teach the word of God with the Bible as the text book and not to discuss systematic theology. Altogether Mr. Ross thought the future of the Bible school was very bright for Christians are realizing the asset it is to the church and the community.

The great chart sermon in the evening will be long remembered by all who heard it. No clearer exposition of the scriptural truths regarding ones relationship to God has been given to the people of Newberg. The conclusion of the sermon remained with the hearers for they and they alone knew where they stood religiously. All who are no longer in the "kingdom of innocence" are either in the "kingdom of world," the "kingdom of apostasy," or the "kingdom of God," said the speaker. Those who have been "born again of water and the Spirit" have left the "kingdom of the world" and are either in the kingdom of God actively engaged in His work or have backslided and are in the kingdom of apostasy. In his appeal Mr. Ross declared that the scriptures teach "ye must be born again" for those who are born but once die twice, but those who are born twice die but once, then live forever.

The meetings will continue for the next two weeks and all those who enjoy good wholesome music and strong scriptural sermons should attend regularly. Mr. Ross will be pleased to discuss any of the great themes with interested parties. Every evening he is devoting a short time to the great issues of the day such as the proposed compulsory school attendance bill, the K. K. K., the K. of C. As he is thoroughly conversant with these matters and intensely 100 per cent American, it is an opportunity that should not be missed by the public to acquaint itself with these facts.

A great rally is brewing in the Bible school and next Sunday we expect to reach the aim set, viz. 175, and then to climb to 200 with ease for the final Sunday. A baby day will be held shortly to welcome in the 30 or more babies enrolled on the cradle roll.

The annual convention of the Churches of Christ in Oregon will be held at Turner July 1-9. This is a real treat for the members and many will attend at least part of the time from this congregation.

A TREE FRUIT DEMONSTRATION

There will be a demonstration of growing tree fruits, on Wednesday, June 28, as follows: Starting from the First National Bank, at Newberg, at 9 o'clock, we will go to the home of Charles Trunk, beyond Dundee, where we will see prunes and walnuts. Then at 10:30 we will go to L. S. Otis' place, near Rex, where we will see pears and prunes. Then lunch at the Springbrook school house, where the Springbrook ladies will furnish free coffee.

There will be an opportunity to see prune trees which have not been sprayed, or pruned.

At 1:30 o'clock we will go to W. E. Burke's place, to see the largest pear orchard in this vicinity. Then at 3:30 o'clock we will go to W. V. Dolph's place in West Chehalem, where we will see apples, walnuts, peaches, prunes, plums, cherries, etc. Everybody is invited. A. R. Mills of Springbrook has been asked by the committee to take charge of the demonstration.
