

FEDERATION OF COMMUNITY CLUBS OF COUNTY WILL PICNIC

Sunday, June 25, Yamhill county federation of community clubs will hold a big picnic at the top of Bald Peak. There will be strawberries and cream and coffee furnished by people of that district to everyone bringing their own cup, berry dish, spoon and pitcher for cream. Each person should bring their own lunch and use the food furnished by the Chehalis people as dessert. There will be a short program immediately following the eating of the basket lunches. R. J. Moore will be the chairman of the day and plans are being made to have two or three short speeches by prominent men, and music by a band and a couple of male quartets.

The top of the mountain is on the boundary line between Washington and Yamhill counties. It is at an elevation of 1675 feet and one can look in one direction and see up and down the Willamette valley, and turn around in his tracks and view the beautiful Tualatin valley. In all, seventeen counties of Oregon and Washington can be seen on a clear day, from this, the highest point in the Chehalis mountains.

To reach the place from points in Yamhill county turn north from the main highway one mile east of Newberg, go through Springbrook, up the new graded road, signs will point to Bald Peak picnic.

Letters have been written inviting as guests of honor: Governor Olcott, Walter M. Pierce, Senator W. G. Hare of Washington county, McCroskey, Senator Charles Hall, Senator C. J. Edwards of Tillamook, and Mayor Baker. There will be traffic officers to handle the crowds and arrangements are being made for all accommodations possible on that day.

ANOTHER FARM BUREAU BERRY DEMONSTRATION

The Farm Bureau will hold another berry demonstration on Monday, June 26, leaving Newberg at 9:00 a. m. and following in a general way the same route taken the first time. This time, however, no effort will be made to inspect strawberries or gooseberries, but a number of other fields of the other varieties of berries will be studied where convenient.

On this trip we will note especially summer cultivation, summer pruning, and the relation of the different cultural practices to the yield as indicated by the quantity of fruit now on the canes. In those berries that are not summer pruned we will have an especially good opportunity to note the various methods of training the new canes so as to protect them from the cultivating and the pickers.

We note also learn the various methods of handling both fruit and pickers to secure best results.

Does it pay to thin loganberry canes and red raspberries in the summer? If anyone has tried this out let us hear from you. We now have the reply from O. A. C. on dieback, also a few remarks on the thinning proposition, and this letter will be presented to you at some stage on the trip if desired. We also have the government report from Portland on the berry situation for the whole state.

Those who do not have autos, or friends who can take them, may report to me or be on hand at Newberg in time so we may engage transportation for them. We note that there will be a farm bureau picnic at the Webfoot church south of Dayton, July 1, several prominent speakers being on the program. Further particulars in the Farm Bureau News. We hope to have a good delegation from Newberg attend the picnic. If this one is a success it is planned to have one in the Newberg zone a little later in the season. Berry Project Leader.
