NEWBERG WHITNEY BOYS MAKE BIG SHOWING IN PORTLAND

Charles A. Morris, the director of the local Whitney Boys' chorus is very proud of the Newberg boys in both the parade and concerts held in Portland in connection with the Rose Festival.
The Newberg boys with their red caps were plainly distinguished from all other Whitney boys and when they obtained an especially good name for their excellent behavior, then we all had the feeling that we were glad that we lived in Newberg.
The Newberg boys found a surprise Saturday night when the Portland paper announced that the Newberg chorus was to give special music at the First Methodist church in Portland on Sunday morning. On account of the short notice the boys paged the town Saturday night and at eight o'clock Sunday morning there were eighty boys and helpers at the high school for a little rehearsal before going to Portland. The part which makes Newberg justly proud of her boys is the fact that the Methodist church of Portland asked Mr. Whitney for his best chorus and he answered, "I'll send Newberg."
The helpers who are Mr. Frost, Mr. McWhannel, Mr. Sears, Mr. Martin and Mr. Bateham, rallied to the call and with the boys, made a fine showing for Newberg. To show a sample of the real spirit of these helpers, we would mention that Mr. Sears had been engaged to go with the band to Bald Peak Sunday afternoon. When the call from the Whitney Boys came, he was right there and made the early trip to Portland to assist in the singing and then rushed back and met his appointment at Bald Peak in the afternoon. This is the kind of spirit which Newberg has behind her boys.
The people of the First Methodist church in Portland took the boys home with them for dinner, and the fine dinners, ice cream, car rides and courteous hospitality of those people gave our boys as they expressed it, the best time of their lives.
One of the men of Portland said that he wanted to take five boys to dinner and entertain them all afternoon and take them back to Newberg in his car in the evening as he wanted to get a little bit acquainted with the town that had been so well represented in the Portland festival. He made his first trip to Newberg, as probably many others on account of our representation in Portland, in all respects it was worth while.
