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DEATH OF JAMES W. KELLY OCCURRED LAST SUNDAY

James W. Kelly, who has been living on the Three Oaks farm in the Sunnycrest district west of Newberg for about three years passed away at his home last Sunday, death being caused by heart failure. Mr. Kelly was born near Frankfort, Missouri, April 7, 1849, and was 73 years, 2 months and 18 days old at the time of his decease.

In 1877 he moved to the Black Hills country in the vicinity of Deadwood, South Dakota, and located at Galena. A few years later he took up a homestead at Little Elk in the same state and lived on this homestead until three years ago when he moved to Oregon.

The deceased leaves a widow, Mrs. Emily Kelly and two children, Mrs. H. D. Runkel of Spokane, Wash., and J. R. Kelly of Lewiston, Idaho; and two step-children, George and Billy Stillwell.

Funeral services were conducted from the Hollingsworth undertaking parlors at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday, Mrs. J. A. Wendell, healer for the Christian Science society, officiating. The many beautiful floral pieces bespoke the high esteem in which Mr. Kelly is held in his community. Interment took place in the local cemetery.

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
