Conserve Moisture in Orchards
 Due to the present drouth, orchardists who do not have irrigation should take care of the moisture supply. Moisture can be conserved by cultivation but not added to. As long as the dry spell lasts growers are urged to cultivate thoroughly at least once a week as late as the middle to the latter part of August. This will maintain good growing conditions, sizable fruit and prevent the "draught spot."

Grass Mixture Advice Given
 The experiment station can make the analyses of grass seeds to go into mixtures, advise just how much to use in the mixture and how much to sow. Have the seed tested early.

Growth of Nursery Stock Curtailed
 The growth of nursery stock and young trees will be somewhat curtailed this year because of the severe dry spell. Anyone desiring to bud trees should plan to do this by the first to the tenth of August, depending on variety, in order to insure the bark peeling well.

 England Swept by Craze for Typical Touch in Names From Inns to Babies.

London.—In the wake of the marriage of Princess Mary to Viscount Lascelles, country-wide craze has developed for naming children and things in honor of the occasion and its principals.

From different parts of the country come reports of such names as "Royal Wedding Hill," and "Princess Mary Shaw." Innumerable Harrys, Marys, Mary Alexandras and so on figure in registrations of the last few days.

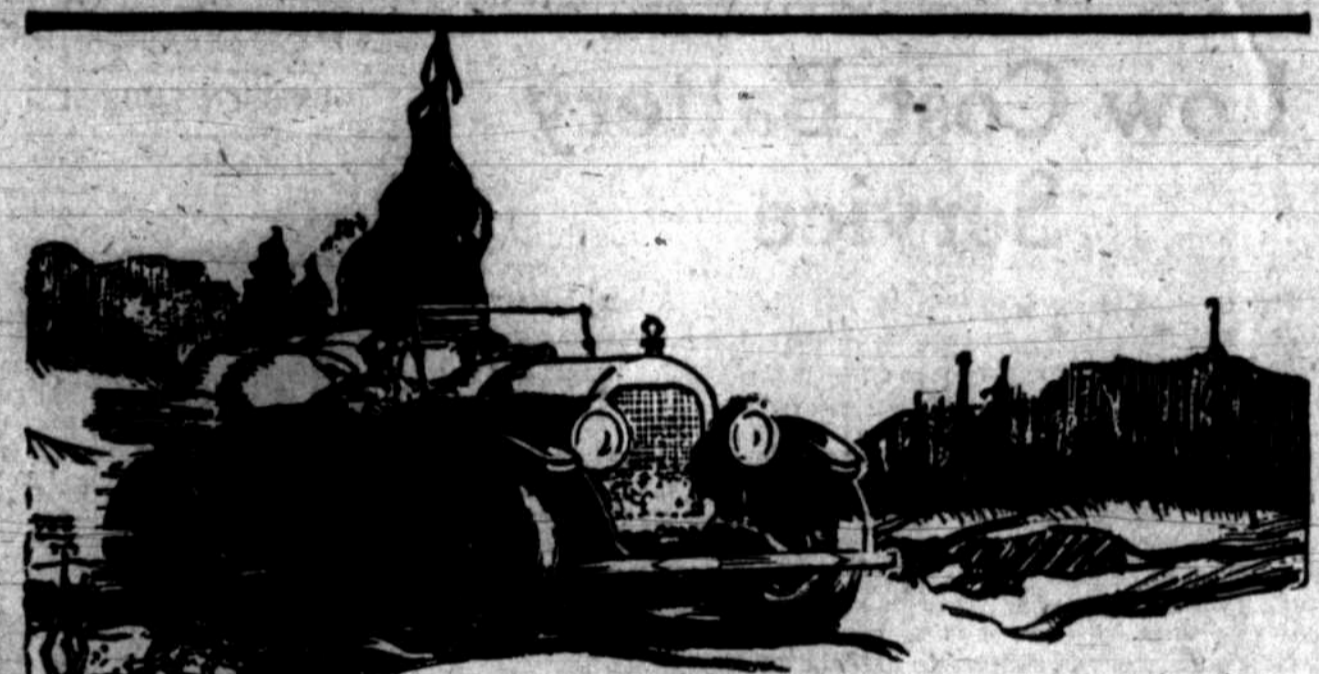
