A REMINISCENCE OF THE DAYS OF SLAVERY

In sending out gospels, testaments and bibles into remote places in our great country for free distribution, the Scripture Gift Mission sometimes comes across strange and interesting incidents. One that came to our notice recently is a reminiscence of the old slavery days, happily long since past. It came in letters applying for a pulpit bible for a church in one of the southern states and reads as follows:

"I arranged to give this bible to a church here whose membership is composed largely of the descendants of the last slaves who were brought over from Africa. Four of its members are ex-slaves, natives of Africa, brought here in 1858 on the last slave ship. * * * A little later on I shall send you a story concerning the last slaves that were brought to America and the last slave ship. They were landed here in 1858. Four of them still live. The hull of the ship which brought them is in a bayou about three miles above our school. I have some of the wood of the ship in my possession. The gavel used at our conference was made from this wood. * * * We have 275 teachers studying here, a number of them reading scriptures that were obtained from your society."

The aim of the Scripture Gift Mission is to supply free scriptures (so far as contributions permit) to Christian workers, pastors and teachers throughout our great country, but mostly in places remote from the large cities and centers of population. Its field extends from the seacoast fishermen of Maine to the Indians of California and the Esquimaux of Alaska. Its scriptures are printed in over eighty different languages.

Hundreds of appeals are received from homes that have never had a portion of the Word of God in this enlightened country and thousands of lives have been greatly blessed and entire communities have been changed by the simple reading of the Book of Life, provided by this mission. Applications for scriptures have been received from more than fifteen different states as shown by our Bulletin No. 23, which may be had by writing to R. B. Haines, Jr., secretary, 119 South Fourth Street, Philadelphia, Pa., to whom contributions may be sent to aid this distribution work.

PORTLAND IS AFTER GREAT CHURCH MEET

Proposal to hold the national Christian Endeavor convention at Portland in 1925 was endorsed by the California State Endeavorers' session in Oakland July 5-9, after considerable discussion by the San Francisco organization. This action removes the last western opposition to the proposal to go before the national convention in Des Moines next year, as several members of the society from San Francisco had announced at the last gathering that they would put in a bid. A parade of the 1500 endeavor workers in Portland will be staged as the introduction to a drive for \$15,000 in January, according to preliminary plans of the finance committee headed by Lloyd Carrick. This sum must be guaranteed to the board of trustees at the convention next July, before possibility for the next bi-yearly meeting—Telegram.
