MAY CUT OUT "OBEY"

Important Changes in Episcopal Marriage Ritual Proposed.

Recognition of the Changed Status of Women May Bring Revision of Vows—May Omit Compulsory Giving in Marriage.

New York.—Recognition of the changed status of women by striking from the Episcopal marriage ceremony the promise to obey, and eliminating the compulsory giving in marriage, was proposed by the commission on revision of the Book of Common Prayer, in a report just made public.

Gaining equal rights with men in their marriage vows, however, the women would lose a special privilege now accorded them. For the proposal to change the ceremony also provides for striking out the bridegroom's pledge, "with all my worldly goods I thee endow."

The commissioner's report will be submitted to the triennial general convention of the church at Portland, Ore., next September. Under the constitution of the church, it cannot be adopted until it has been approved by two general conventions.

Six pages of the report are devoted to the proposed changes in the marriage ceremony, the first hint of the breadth of the revision appearing in the following:

"Make the promise of the man and of the woman identical in form:

"Wilt thou love him, comfort him, honor, and keep him in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, keep thee only unto him, so long as ye both shall live?"

At present the woman promises to

"obey" and "serve."

The next change would make it possible for the clergyman to omit:

"Who giveth this woman to be married to this man?" And would provide for the singing of a hymn or anthem at this point.

The report continues:

"Amend the sentence in regard to the ring, by omitting the words 'and with all my worldly goods I thee endow.'" This change would make the ring pledge of the bridegroom read:

"With this ring I thee wed: in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen."

The present final report was expressly ordered published six months in advance of the Portland convention.

PARCEL POST USES INCREASE

Shipments of Fruit and Vegetables Are Steadily Growing, Says Post Office Official.

Washington.—Shipments of fruits and vegetables in great quantities by retail and wholesale merchants to all sections of the United States is steadily increasing, according to reports made to General Superintendent W. H. Riddell of the railway mail service.

As an illustration of the use to which the parcel post is being put by merchants, it was asserted by Superintendent Riddell that recently an entire freight car was loaded with individual cases of asparagus and shipped by parcel post rates. Each parcel, however, conformed to weight regulations, and it would not have been possible to ship the carload as a bulk, it was explained.

Department officials said that there appeared to be no reason why sufficient numbers of crates to make up a half car or a carload, cannot be shipped in the future as parcel post.

Never in Pairs.

Badgers are rarely seen out of their burrows in the daytime, and this is the reason that, traveling over the western plains, one so seldom sees a badger, although their burrows are very numerous and every indication exists of the presence of these animals, says the American Forestry Magazine. They chiefly come forth at night; and it is the rarest thing to find a pair together. For some reason or other, the sexes pursue their avocations usually apart.
