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MORE NEWS FROM THE MOORES ON TRIP EAST

From Spokane via Wallace, Idaho, to Missoula, our hardest points were Hair Pin Curve and Camel's Hump over the summit of the Bitter Root mountains—hills, rocks and crags. Miles of nothing but wild woods, where bear, elk and deer abide. The only species we got to see was a small deer which ran across the trail. From Missoula we went to Butte, Montana, via Drummond, Deer Lodge and Anaconda. The towns mentioned are all small. Missoula and Deer Lodge are beautiful places. On this drive we had excellent roads save a few chucks and bumps, and missed our trail once and drove 97 miles to get 56 and on this round-about way paid 45c for gas and 70c a quart for oil, very common at that but glad to get it. From Butte to the park via West Yellowstone and way points. At Twin Bridges we camped for three days. Also visited Virginia City, Montana's first capital, which at one time had a population of 30,000. This was during the Alder's Gulch gold find. Now the population is only 300. From this place we went via Ennis and Cameron to Hutchins ranch all along the Madison river. Then via Herben's dam to West Yellowstone. This dam is fifty feet high and 300 feet long and makes a lake out of the river. Here we encountered our worst roads on account of rocks. Will write again soon. H. G. Moore.

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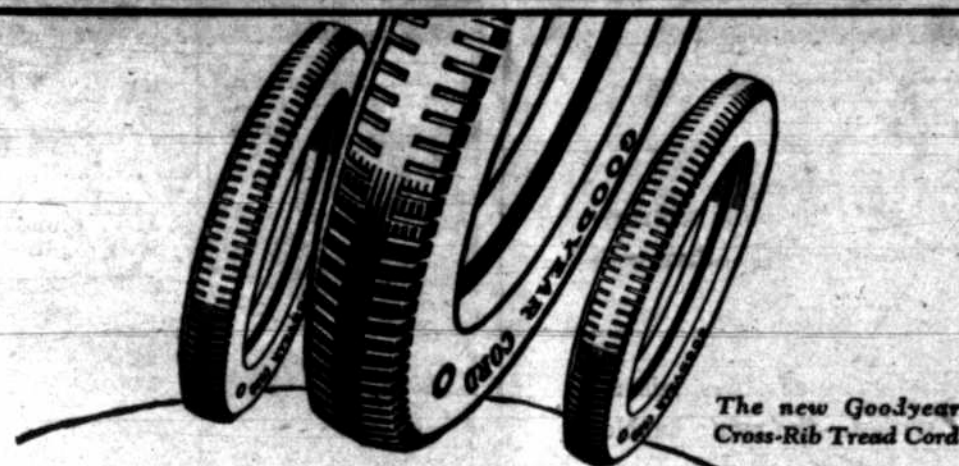
