M. O. EVANS RESIGNS FROM OREGON GROWERS

M. O. Evans, field manager of Oregon Growers' cooperative association has tendered his resignation which will become effective August 1, according to a recent announcement. Owing to departmental reorganization the field department has been eliminated as such and it was stated will be combined with other departments as recommended by the board of directors in an effort to reduce expenses.

During the two and one-half years of service with the association, Mr. Evans has personally signed up 300 of the 2100 members and it is said that he is acquainted with more members than any other officer or employee of the association.

He has personally supervised the receiving station at Newberg and the moving of the large tonnage of fruit from this district. He will take a few months' vacation before entering other work.

FARM POINTERS

(O. A. C. Experiment Station.)

Silage is an insurance against a long winter and short hay crop, as well as an economical feed for sheep and cattle. The full value of the silo was felt in the late hard winter with hay out of sight. The Union experiment station has found that a combination of hay and silage produces twice the daily gains at half the cost of gains on hay alone.

When ants become troublesome whole colonies may be destroyed by mixing a teaspoonful of tartar emetic with a tablespoonful of honey, spreading it on a piece of bread and placing this bait in the path of the ants. They carry portions of the poisoned honey to their young as well as eat of it themselves.

Aphis on cabbage and kale plants are particularly bad this year in many parts of Oregon. Black leaf 40, diluted according to directions on the package will clean them out when properly applied. A good soap suds rather than clear water will assist in spreading the solution, making it more effective and economical of labor and material.

The codling moth spray for sum-

mer protection was due in most districts before the end of July. Growers in doubt as to arrival of infestations can consult either the county agents or extension department station workers as convenient.

Land in the Willamette valley that is to be sown to fall crops can be disced to advantage before the fall rain. This puts the land in shape so that it can be plowed earlier, which is an essential thing for successful fall sown grain.
