## Salmon Loaf

Open a large can of salmon, free from skin and bone and drain thoroughly. Flake the fish, adding to it the juice of an onion, a tablespoon of capers, a tablespoon of crumbs, pepper, salt and a small cup of rich cream sauce. Make a good crust, roll it out thin, place the salmon mixture in the center, roll like a fruit roll, pinch the ends together, lay on a buttered baking dish and bake until the crust is done. Serve on a hot platter and offer a good drawn butter with the roll. Peas, asparagus or fried eggplant may be served with the roll, or plain baked potatoes will be sufficient.
