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## THE PAVED ROAD SITUATION

Will the editor of some reader of this paper kindly give us a little light on the question of re-paving the highway from Newberg to Portland? The question of widening the pavement seems justifiable both from the standpoint of safety and that of utility, but where the writer and many others as well are "up in the air" is on the question of renewing the surface when the pavement is not much more than dry and cured sufficiently for traffic.

Here is the pertinent question that we want answered. Are we going to be forced to rebuild all of our paved roads in Oregon long before they are paid for, in fact almost before we have begun to pay for them, and if so, when we get them built who is going to pay all these double or triple paving bills? Something must be wrong. There is no question but some of our officials have been negligent. Either of two things is certain, the road was not properly constructed in the first place or else it was not properly protected afterwards.

Mr. Taxpayer, it is up to you and me to ferret out and remedy the situation. If we are going to be forced to rebuild in this manner we had better know it now as we will either have to "cut it out" or go broke. It might be well to call attention to one of the main factors in road destruction and that is the freight traffic that is permitted on our highways. Far be it from me to condemn all of this business, but it must be more carefully regulated or the trucks will "kill the goose that lays the golden egg." In other words they will raise such a storm of protest from the taxpayers that they will be driven from the pavements entirely. It is safe to say that the truck business is ruining not only the railroads, but our paved roads as well, and in either case the cost is coming out of producer and consumer. Are we going to put up with this allways?

No doubt we get freight hauled a little cheaper by truck than by rail in the first instance, but when we go a little further down the line and have to pay increased taxes to keep up our roads, and have to pay higher freight rates for what we do have hauled by rail it is a serious question whether we are any better off than had we shipped it all by rail. But trucks have come to stay and it is well for us in more ways than one, but we must see to it that they stay within bounds so as to serve but not ruin us.

But in the final showdown it was our officials who have been at fault either in the construction or maintenance of our pavements, and we must see that such things do not always continue. C. W. Bradshaw.

## OREGON CAMP FIRE PERMITS NOW NECESSARY

Due to the forest fire situation in Oregon, Acting District Forester E. N. Kavanaugh has issued instructions to all federal forest officers in the state to require permits for camp fires on national forest lands, to be effective immediately. It is the first time that such a rule has been put into effect in Oregon.

"The forests are very dry, many fires are starting and the extreme necessity of care with fire in the woods was never so important, and the public is urgently asked to realize this danger to Oregon's most valuable resource," says Mr. Kavanaugh.

Permits are being required for building camp fires on national forest lands in the states of Washington and California, and the extremely dry conditions of forest lands in Oregon make the permit system absolutely necessary, forest officers say. The instructions provide that suitable signs shall be placed at entrances to the national forests regarding the necessity of camp fire permits, as well as at ranger stations and summer resorts, and the widest publicity is being given to the new rule. Season permits will be issued only to regular users of the forests such as men in charge of livestock and going operations on the national forests. At specially prepared forest camp grounds where there is a forest officer in charge, as at Eagle Creek, no permit will be required, the instructions state.

## GIVES ADVICE FOR PREVENTION OF CANCER

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 24.—One's life may depend on the prompt medical examination of a mole, skin blemish or lump, painful or not, according to the warning given in an address here by Dr. Joseph Calk Bloodgood, noted authority on cancer, who is making a tour of the country as part of a campaign of education against the spread of that scourge which claims eighty thousand American lives each year.

Dr. Bloodgood, who is professor of surgery at Johns Hopkins medical school, declares in brief that cancer can always be prevented if taken in time but can rarely be cured. Prevention is his slogan.

Following in brief, are his words of warning:

For the smoker: "Cancer of the lip, tongue and mucous membrane of the tongue and cheeks, attacks adults who use tobacco in any form and who have ragged, dirty teeth. The combination is the cause; and the combination is unnecessary."

For persons with skin marks: "Warts and moles and other abnormalities of the skin can be divided into three groups."

1. Those which should be removed at once, because they are of the kind which frequently develop into cancer.

2. Those skin defects, like little red birthmarks, and things like freckles, in which cancer practically never develops, and to which no attention after the first examination need be given.

3. Those skin defects which should be watched and removed if they show any sign of growth, weeping or ulceration.

For women: "Cancer of the uterus attacks the mothers of our children. It is largely or entirely due to the neglect of the proper repair or healing of the injuries due to child-bearing. There is much evidence that cancer of the uterus is a preventable disease. It is certainly, largely curable if recognized at once."

"A lump in the breast of any woman over 25 years of age should receive immediate medical examination."

For every adult: "When you know you are sick in your insides, go to your family physician and demand a thorough examination with the X-ray and other laboratory methods."

"A surface sore that is 'ripe' is, if it should happen to be cancer, 'ripe' for death and not for cure."
