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LEGUMES ARE GOOD FEED AND ALSO SOIL BUILDERS

Chemical analyses of Oregon legumes and hay is expected to be ready for distribution in a few weeks.

A summary of the work on legumes that will give farmers a better knowledge of the fertilizer requirements and assure them a place in their farming systems are nearing completion at the agricultural college experiment station.

The investigations will determine the mineral content of the leading Oregon legumes, and develop information that will be of value to livestock feeders.

"Legumes such as alfalfa, red clover, alsike, vetches and peas and beans are not only high in feeding value but excellent rejuvenators of soils," said J. S. Jones, agricultural chemist at the station in charge of the investigations. "They have special importance in agriculture as they can be inoculated with nitrogen-fixing bacteria. Continuous growing of small grains has given western Oregon much rundown lands, which a wider knowledge of and use of legumes will do a great deal to correct."

Many samples of legumes used generally for feeding or soil renewal have been carefully analyzed to determine feeding and fertility content and value.

The analyses will be followed by nutritional study to determine their feeding value. No work in animal nutrition has yet been conducted in Oregon, and these studies will prove valuable to livestock men, Professor Jones believes.

FARM BUREAU NOTES

To the Blackberry Growers—Why in the name of common sense don't you prune out your vines if you have either Himalayas or Evergreens before you try to pick the crop? Don't you know that you will get more and better berries, and with a great deal less work than otherwise?

While writing the above lines a grower of Himalayas called to learn about pruning them, and it appears that very few people really know the advantages of pruning blackberries before picking. Many people who raise loganberries or blackcaps don't want a blackberry on the place, and to such let me say either you do not understand handling them or else you don't like to work a little on the side.

Properly pruned and cultivated there is no other berry in this valley that can compare with blackberries in productiveness, and further, they are just as easy to pick as any of the others. Prune the new canes any time before picking. Leave only what canes you want to train up next season, and cut them off the proper length for training, then cut off all the laterals or side branches just before time to pick berries. By keeping the new canes on the ground and trained in line with the row there is nothing in the way either on the ground or up among the berries. When your vines are thus trained you will find that your wife and other pickers cannot be kept out of the patch when picking time comes, but as it is usually the case now it is difficult to "get them out" when once they are entangled in the briars.

I will be glad to demonstrate the truth of the above statements to anyone who is interested and will visit my place at any time.

BIG NEW FEATURES ADDED TO COLOSSUS

All who glance over the cable news or who read the magazines must have noted the many contracts entered into by the Ringling Brothers for foreign talent last winter. A special ship was chartered this spring to bring the hundreds of human performers, trained animal acts and equine displays to America. More than a million persons saw the mammoth new circus of 1922 during the weeks that it exhibited in Madison Square Garden, New York. Now this marvelous exhibition is touring the country aboard five great railroad trains. It is a third bigger than the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey show of last season. It is ten times larger than any other circus now on tour.

Big as is this wonder circus of 1922—with its more than twenty trained wild animal displays in steel arenas, fully 150 wonderfully schooled trick horses, 700 men and women performers, 100 clowns, and scores of features—the price of admission is no more than before.
