W. C. T. U. NOTES ON ENFORCEMENT OF LAW

Some Truths Spoken By Our Great Men On The Subject Of Law Enforcement

Let reverence for the laws be breathed by every American mother to the lisping babe that prattles on her lap; let it be taught in schools, in seminaries and colleges; let it be written in primers, spelling-books and almanacs; let it be preached from pulpits; proclaimed in legislative halls and enforced in courts of justice; in short let it become the political religion of the nation; and let the old and young, the rich and the poor, the grave and the gay, of all sexes and tongues and colors and conditions, sacrifice unceasingly upon its altars. Abraham Lincoln.

"I wish that we might have in America a revival of regard for the sanctity and majesty of the law. I wish that it might be preached by the parents in the home as well as by teacher in the school; by the preacher in the pulpit; the writer and the cartoonist; through the press; the actor on the stage; by every good citizen and agency." To make the voting public apprehend the truth about the sacredness and effectiveness of the eighteenth amendment, and comprehend the real motive of those who seek its overthrow should be our sacred task until the storm clouds of opposition have been driven away by the clear sunlight of truth. 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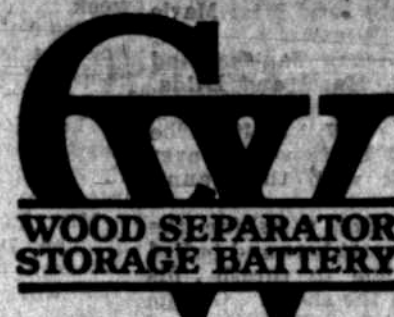
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
