PACIFIC NORTHWEST WIDELY ADVERTISED

Eastern Papers Tell Story of Scenic and Vacation Advantages of This Wonderful Section

That the Pacific Northwest has at last attained a fixed place in the galaxy of national summer resorts and that its fame has reached even the most conservative centers of the eastern states is shown by the way it is being featured this season by the established touring companies and summer resort guide books. There are good roads, magnificent scenery, including glaciers, mountains, forests, waterfalls, lakes, rivers, sea beaches, fjords and pastoral scenes that will bring a thrill of wonder to the most blasé globe trotter. And the entire region, vast as an empire, is easily accessible, for it is served by nine transcontinental railways and a number of national highways for automobile travel.

"A vacation in this land of wonders is the acme of climatic delight, as it rarely becomes warmer than 80 degrees in the middle of the day, while cool, healthy, sleep-inducing nights prevail.

"In its forests and meadows poisonous reptiles and insects are alike unknown. The mountain summits are high enough and climbs are rugged enough to satisfy the most experienced Alpinists, while comfortable camps and hotels, nestled beside highland lakes and rivers, gratify the taste of those who prefer to go mountaineering de luxe.

This guide also includes a full page advertisement of the Pacific Northwest Tourists Association which announces the 28% reduction in summer fares and tells how to spend a vacation that is "different" among the varied attractions of "this great out doors." This same advertisement also appeared in the Monday evening edition of the Public Ledger and in 43 other important papers in the United States and Canada as a part of the campaign which has been so effective in bringing tourists to the Pacific northwest this summer.

MANY YOUNG PEOPLE WANT TO WORK WAY THROUGH COLLEGE

Pacific College is always anxious to assist young men and young women who must work their way through college, in whole or in part. More than half of the student body every year earn a part or all of their expenses by work during the college year.

The college always provides employment directly for a goodly number of students, in janitor work, dining room work, library and laboratory work, work on the campus, etc. But every year there are many prospective students who must find employment which the college itself cannot provide, or must be deprived of the privilege of going on with their college work.

Already the college has information of thirty prospective students, all of whom desire employment, and at least half of whom positively cannot be in Pacific College unless they find places where they can earn a part or all of their expenses.

In this group are a number of very fine young women who would accept positions in private homes to work for board and room, to care for children, etc., or who could work in stores or offices. There are young men fitted for janitor work, work in stores, odd jobs of all sorts, etc.

Anyone who can provide employment for any of these ambitious young people will be doing a genuine service, and at the same time will be getting assistance that will be worth all that it costs and more.

LOCAL MEN OFFER HOMES TO THOSE WHO CAN'T PAY

There is an increasing tendency on the part of the general public to rent their homes rather than own them. This is really deplorable as it does not encourage thrift and saving and instead encourages the roaming disposition which is perhaps best described in that old adage, "The rolling stone gathers no moss." Of course we are well aware that the average younger person of today flippantly replies to that, "Who wants to gather moss anyhow," but nevertheless the owning of one's own home is a thing to be desired when viewed from almost any angle.

We make this statement of fact as the preface to a story of local opportunity given for the acquiring of a home for one's self without a great outlay of cash. It is probable that one of the factors which has prevented many persons from owning their own home in the past has been the fact that most young people starting out in life did not have a thousand dollars or more with which to buy lots and start building. Some houses have already been built there and others will doubtless soon be erected. They are offering home sites here for a low price and are willing to aid the would-be home owner by giving him his own terms. If he shows any real desire to own his own home. In other words they are saying to the young man, who is trying to get a home started, "Come to us and if you are in earnest, we will not require you to pay a large sum of money down and a large amount each month, but we will meet you more than half way. We will accept a very small payment down and small monthly payments which anyone can make. Furthermore, if you want to build on your lot, we will make it possible for you to secure your building material."

The Graphic is not telling this story to advertise this piece of real estate, but we believe that Messrs. Graff and Warner have the right idea and are offering the man who could not otherwise own his home an opportunity which he really needs. We believe that in future years, those who find it possible to buy these tracts under such reasonable conditions, will be willing to acknowledge the spirit of these men who are not trying to get every cent of cash they can out of them now, but who are willing to take a chance on a young man who wants to own his home. It is a rare opportunity and we believe it will be taken up by a large number of those who have been looking for just such a chance and in this way it will be a really good thing for Newberg.
