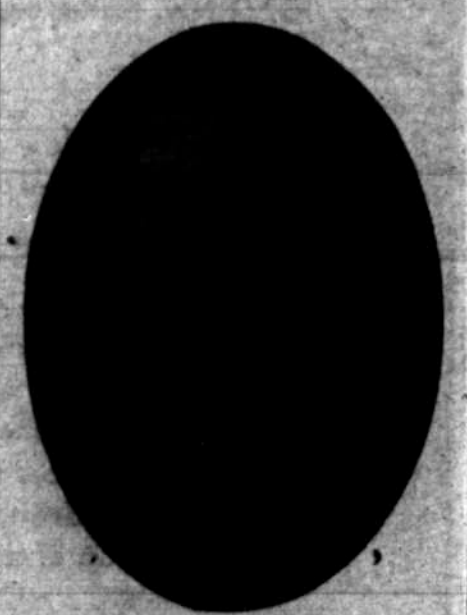

OBITUARY

Morris Franklin Childs was born November 6, 1858, at Goshen, Hardin county, Ohio, and died at Newberg, October 8, 1922. He was married June 20, 1883, to Clara L. Vrooman, who with a half brother, Rev. J. P. Childs of Kansas, and a half sister, Mrs. Hattie Marmon, survive him. Converted in early life Rev. Childs began preaching at the age of eighteen and continued in this work until about three years



ago, when because of falling health he was obliged to retire from the active ministry. He then came to Newberg to make his home. His health continued to fail until on October 3 he had a stroke of paralysis and lived but a few days after.

Reverend Childs was an able preacher before his health failed and occupied prominent pulpits in the Free Methodist church to which he belonged. Among these were charges in Chicago and Topeka, Kas. He was always genial and sympathetic and was very loyal to the principles of righteousness as he saw them. Since coming to Newberg, he has made many friends and whenever able has assisted in church work. His great desire was that he might once more be permitted to take his place as a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The funeral was held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Free Methodist church in this city. Six of his brother ministers acted as pall bearers. Reverend W. N. Coffey, assisted by Rev. H. E. Kreider, conducted the funeral services. Rev. and Mrs. G. G. Edwards, old time friends of Rev. Childs, sang several songs. The interment was in the Newberg cemetery.
