TELEPHONE-REGISTER'S BLUFF

The Graphic carries at the top of its pages the statement "Largest circulation in Yamhill County." Probably everyone who reads the Graphic has seen that statement. During the past few weeks the McMinnville Telephone-Register has adopted a scheme in full keeping with the mind of an unscrupulous newspaper man who will stop at nothing to attain an end. After issuing a sworn statement of circulation a few months ago, in which, according to their own figures they had a total number of copies issued during the year per week of 1440 and in view of the further statement which they themselves made that they had broadcasted large numbers, (in fact about 10,000 copies of one issue) over the county, they now come out with a sworn statement of the bona fide paid circulation of 1782 copies, not including any copies sent out as samples.

The publishers of the Graphic are not exactly fools and we do not propose to get into any show-down stunt with the T-R. people for we feel justified in assuming that men who would stoop to the unscrupulous method of charging their home people \$2.00 per year for their paper and then coming into the Newberg territory and selling their paper to some people at \$1 a year and others at 50c a year would also stoop to justify what must be an untenable position.

The Graphic publishers lay no claims to 1782 paid in advance subscribers nor do we believe, in spite of sworn statements, that the Telephone-Register has any such list of bona fide subscribers. It is such an easy matter to pad a list that we doubt not their ability to show their friends anywhere from 1500 to 5000 names on a list, and we could do the same, if we so desired. So far as we are concerned this will end for us an unpleasant episode. We refuse further to enter into a discussion of the matter. We believe that the people of Newberg know the publishers of the Graphic well enough so that they will take our word on this matter. We believe that the quality of the paper which we have been issuing is such that it will back up what we say. We do not intend to run down any other paper, but it is a well known fact that in an open contest with the Telephone-Register and over sixty other papers the Graphic was awarded first prize and the Telephone-Register did not secure a place at all. Neither did they secure a place the previous year when the Graphic

was awarded a tie for fourth place and the Telephone-Register's competitor—the News-Reporter, was also tied for a fourth place. The Telephone-Register has succeeded in some way in getting the county printing, but that means little to Newberg people. They claim to be the official county paper but as such they publish very little county news that the Graphic does not give to its subscribers. They do publish extended reviews of articles and editorials from the Portland daily papers, which the Graphic does not frequently do, but we doubt very much the extreme value of this to their readers.

The Telephone-Register says that there have been times when it was sent into every home in the county, but that there was a demand for it. Like many of their other statements, this will hardly bear close inspection. We recently had three different people bring copies of the Telephone-Register into our office and make remarks similar to this: "You can have this, we have no use for it." We have also seen copies of their "demanded" paper lying in the post office waste basket where those who "demanded" them had discarded them before going home. We might go further in the proof of our contention, but what's the use. We know that not a long time ago we had a considerably larger circulation than did the Telephone-Register. We have no reason to believe that this condition is not true today. Consequently we shall continue to assert that the Graphic has the largest circulation in Yamhill county.

Yamhill county world war veterans have received \$143,507.80 from the bonus and loan act.

Fines Yield \$3000 in 6 Months

For the period extending from January 1 to July 1, 1922, fines to the amount of \$3000.50 were collected by the sheriff's office and itemized the various amounts follow:

Speeding, \$924.50; overload \$335; reckless driving, \$10; improper license, \$227; no operator's permit, \$20; driving intoxicated, \$225; operating still, \$339; having liquor in possession, \$665; selling liquor, \$250. Last year for the twelve months the fines amounted to \$2460.50.
