THINK WELL!

The time before election is getting very short. Every candidate is grooming himself for the election contest and the public are casting about in their minds in their efforts to choose candidates for the various offices. The Graphic would like to issue this admonition. Don't be misled into voting for someone by some little personal prejudice or small minded gossip. Wherever it is possible study the two candidates for office and decide which will best fill the office for which he is running. Which man has the best qualifications for the office? Which one will best represent you in the various duties of that office? This should apply to every office from city councilman or mayor on up to the United States congressman and governor. There are some offices where principles and party matters may make a considerable difference. These things should be weighed. There are other offices where it need not matter what party a person may represent. In these cases party should be ignored. The Graphic hopes that out of the election contest, the state, county and city may emerge with a set of officials who will be the best suited for the duties of office that it is possible to obtain.

We shall not attempt to dictate to our readers for whom they are going to vote. To do that would be foolish on our part, but we do urge the public to think below the surface when making up their minds to vote. Which of the two candidates for governor are best suited to help reduce taxation for the farmers and the general tax-paying public? Which will carry the state through the next term of office to the best interest of the state? We do not believe that religious feeling should be allowed to enter into this campaign

and regret that it has been injected at all. In the county and other state office contests, similar questions should be asked. In the city contests, we should ask ourselves which of the two candidates for mayor and which of the several candidates for councilmen are best qualified to fill those offices? Of which will we be most proud as our officials? Which ones will give us the best administration of our city's affairs in all respects?

After weighing various candidates in this way, then go to the polls and vote for the ones you consider best suited for the position, but do not let someone fill you with gossip and influence you to vote against some candidate, because they don't personally like them. That is not fair to yourself, to the candidate, or the state, county, or city.

Just as we predicted, there are all sorts of stories afloat regarding the candidates. Why, we even heard one fellow say that Andy Gump was coming out as an independent candidate for mayor. But seriously it is a good time to question closely any election tales and find out what is at the bottom of them.

The type of weather which has been handed out to Oregon this fall has certainly proved satisfactory to almost everyone. It would be hard to please the fellow who would not be satisfied with it.

Raspberries at this time of year in considerable quantity is something worth talking about. When compared with the blizzard which recently swept the middle west it offers some contrast.
