COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

The Merchant school, No. 1, under the supervision of Miss Hazel Carr, has been in session six weeks without a single absence or tardy mark. This is certainly a record to be proud of.

J. E. Calavan, the club leader from the office of the state superintendent, is in the county in the interests of club work. A special effort will be made this year to have Yamhill county second to none in this important phase of educational work.

On Saturday, November 25, at the Commercial club rooms in McMinnville, Oregon, a meeting of the citizens of the county will be held to determine whether or not the county fair shall be made a permanent feature. Do not fail to attend. The time will be 2 o'clock p. m.

The annual institute for Yamhill county will be held in the senior high school building in McMinnville, Oregon, December 6-7-8, 1922. The meeting will open at 10 a. m. on December 6 and close at 3 p. m. on December 8. All teachers are required by law to attend this meeting.

Rollen Stewart has taken the place in school No. 5 made vacant by the death of William Scott.

BETTER CROP AND TILTH BY STRAW AND ROTATION

Grain straw disked into the land in a manuring experiment started last spring at the Oregon Experiment station resulted in better moisture and tith during the summer than was obtained on an adjacent plot that did not have the straw application. The yield of clover hay was increased 1.47 tons, giving a yield at three cuttings of 6.83 tons an acre. The yield of four check plots averaged 4.36 tons. All the plots received two irrigations which made possible a good second and third cutting.

Manure disked and plowed in is giving better yields than where it is disked in after plowing or used as a top dressing, in this experiment. Straw can be scattered out and disked and plowed in, in the fall or it may be spread thinly after seeding as a top dressing.

Beans in a manured rotation gave a yield of two and one-third bushels gain over unmanured beans, in the same kind of rotation on the same soil. The gain amounted to \$7 per acre.
