Definitions differ. One of the most important things in speech is to get right definitions. Disputes arise from no other cause frequently but because people are not using the same words with the same meaning. All manner of corruption of christian teachings come from using sacred words with different meanings from Christ. For instance, what the world calls death is not what God calls death; this is evident from a study of the one book of John's gospel alone. What the world calls love is not what God calls love. What the world calls success, is not what God calls success. What they call profit; what they might call right-doing and living; what they call privileges and benefits, and a hundred other things are not what God means by these terms. The meaning of these words and of all the important sacred words is found in the great book itself, and by observing how these words are there used. Changing the definitions of words is corrupting them. If we have wrong definitions we have corrupt speech. It pays to be slow enough to speak so that we may first know the right meaning of the words we wish to use, and thus may speak aright.

What blessings we have to thank God for this year. While the world has been in turmoil and want, we have had reconstructive processes powerfully at work, and the blessing of great crops and divine mercies. Our farm crops have been reported to be better this year in some ways than last, and last year they were valued by the Department of Agriculture in its final estimates at over five billion, six hundred seventy-five million dollars, coming from nearly 350,000,000 acres under cultivation, and yielding staggering totals in bushels, as of corn over three billion bushels, etc. It is good to pause for a day not only to notice God's mercies to us, but each day "to forget not all His benefits."
