NOTHING TO BRAG ON

Complete returns show the wets premature in celebrating the election as a victory in their campaign to wreck the 18th amendment. Ohio voted down wine and beer by a whaling majority of 187,000; California, former wine-making state, adopted the Wright enforcement act, opening California courts to the prosecution of federal offenders, which means liquor indictments will be handled more speedily and the law be much better enforced. All the wets have to celebrate is the failure of Massachusetts to pass a state prohibition act and the election of a wet senator in New Jersey. Illinois went for beer and wine because the prohibitionists there were mistakenly advised not to vote on the question.

What the election shows is a tendency toward stricter enforcement of prohibition as time goes on.

Just before going to press the News learns definitely that the stock for the new bank has been fully subscribed. This is good news and means that there will be but a short interregnum in Sherwood without a bank. The next step will be to call the new stockholders together, elect officers and apply for a new charter. The new bank ought to be open for business early in January. —Sherwood News.
