WILL BREAK GROUND FOR FIRST COTTAGE FOR BOYS

The Graphic is in receipt of the following announcement of the breaking of ground for the W. C. T. U. Children's Farm Home at Corvallis with a request that we give publicity to the affair. "The board of directors of the W. C. T. U. Children's Farm Home announce the 'Breaking of Ground' for their first cottage near Corvallis at 1:30 p. m., Saturday, Dec. 16, 1922. Your attendance at this ceremony is earnestly requested. Machines to convey guests to the grounds will meet late afternoon trains at Albany and Corvallis."

A letter from Mrs. Ada Wallace Urubt says, "We have the cash on hand and guaranteed to meet all obligations on this building and have met all payments on the farm for many months in advance. Our next work is to secure money for a building for girls, as this one will receive boys only, the Child Welfare Commission not allowing us to keep them both in one cottage. The calls for the care of girls are quite as appealing as for boys and there is really desperate need that the home for them should be commenced at the earliest possible date."

"We hope that all persons who love children and realize in any manner the helplessness of homeless childhood will send in their contributions at once without waiting for personal solicitation, making all checks payable to H. Hirschberg, treasurer, but sending to this office, 615 Stock-Exchange Bldg., Portland, Oregon where all contributions will be receipted and sent to the Treasurer at once."

"There is no possibility of loss of monies given to this home as it has at its head responsible men and women and it is so incorporated that should a very remote chance make it impossible for it to be carried on under the present administration all property will revert to the state to be used for the purpose for which it is incorporated."
