PRODUCTION OF LUMBER IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON

Portland, Ore., Dec. 9.—The total production of lumber during 1921 by Oregon and Washington according to preliminary statistics just released by the department of commerce was 5,829,598,000 feet, which is a decrease of 24 per cent compared with the cut for the preceding year. These statistics are the result of a careful canvass of the lumber and timber products industry in these states by the bureau of the census, department of commerce, and the forest service, United States department of agriculture, acting in cooperation.

Washington has been the chief lumber producing state for many years and Oregon ranked second in 1920. Douglas fir is the principal species cut in both states and for several years their combined output of lumber from this wood has comprised about 95 per cent of the total for the United States.

The forest service reports that the decrease in the lumber cut in Oregon and Washington in 1921, compared with that for 1920 was due to lack of demand, low prices and unsatisfactory shipping facilities, and that the indications are that the 1922 cut, while larger than that of 1921, will also be somewhat less than the cut for 1920.

FARM BUREAU NOTES

Our pooling committee is now in active operation. Many lines have already been listed including feed, tile, dynamite, sprays, nursery stock, fertilizers, etc. This is merely a beginning. The extent of the work will depend entirely on the amount of interest shown in the move. All farmers are entitled to share in the benefits. All that is required is that you join the farm bureau if not a member at present. From five to fifty per cent can easily be saved by getting large orders and buying in quantities.

Remember that no legitimate business is being injured by this method. We are merely taking advantage of the same principle used by all large concerns, that is, buy in large quantities and get special rates, and buy for cash and get the cash discounts. As a rule merchants would prefer to handle our business in this manner than otherwise. We are often our own worst enemies when we buy in small lots. We are paying for the service that we should be doing for ourselves, and for which we really secure no benefit. It is simply a lack of thrift on our part. We often blame the middle man when we should look in the glass and see the real offender. So if you want sufficient quantities of anything, just call up any member of the committee and see if they can do anything for you. Pools will be closed as soon as they are large enough to make it worth while and others will be opened immediately.

A question has been raised as to the election of president of our zone for the coming year. Our constitution does not require a majority to elect, hence it will be necessary to decide whether or not a plurality is sufficient. To relieve any question in the matter it would be well to take another ballot at the next meeting. As it now stands it is a question whether the old officer holds over, the new one is elected, or the new vice president takes the place.

ADVERTISING OREGON

The year 1923 will mark the beginning of a new development for Oregon. The state will be advertised nationally on a par with other Western states for the first time in its history.

The state-wide development program, for which a fund of \$200,000 is being raised for a two-year period, will provide \$150,000 per year. The bulk of this amount will be expended in advertising the opportunities Oregon has to offer the world. This item in itself is a sizable one. Although it does not equal the amount expended annually by other states, it marks a long step in the right direction. Heretofore the state has expended nothing.

Another fund for the advertising of the Northwest states will be made available during 1923 for a three-year period. This refers to a million dollar appropriation made by the Burlington, Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railroads, to be

devoted to exploiting the scenic and industrial resources of the Northwest through advertising in magazines of national circulation. Assuming that Oregon will benefit from this expenditure on an equal basis with other Northwest states, an additional \$200,000 will be added to Oregon's advertising budget.

Another important development along this line is the growing number of Oregon industries that are advertising nationally. Each of these individual advertising campaigns carry the message of Oregon throughout the nation. The building up of strong co-operative marketing organizations, capable of advertising nationally, will add to the total. Oregon is learning the necessity of advertising. Although immediate results can not be expected, the records of other states show that ultimate returns may be practically unlimited.—Oregon Journal of Commerce.
