Of course the young may for the first time run across some idea or theory that looks new to them and full of attractiveness and brilliancy, which yet may have long been in the minds of men and have become an old story to philosophers and theorists and dreamers. Let us all know today that the Divine Word is to be searched for the deepest and most fundamental truths and things most vital to man and society, and that rationalism and infidelity lead to degeneracy and radicalism, wild socialism.

tic theories, anarchy and chaos. This is truth, attested by both the Word and the history on which we do so well to be informed. Rationalism is but pride and self-conceit in every age; it is no more active or powerful today than the secret and generating skepticism of the Middle Ages; and the Medieval skepticism seemed only to serve the cause of the truth after all. Unbelief is marked by the impotence for all constructive purposes. Its strength and genius lie only in the direction of destruction, as Canon Liddon so well said, a half century ago. It boasts of being about to establish a "Religion of Humanity." Let him that is putting on the armour, not boast as he that putteth it off. The deepest needs of human nature never have been satisfied and apparently never will be, but in the Heavenly One whose name is yet the only name whereby we can be saved.
