There is nothing in the recent withdrawal from entry of the large area in Central Oregon that will interfere with the prosecution to completion of any claims that had been initiated prior to the date of the withdrawal—July 31. Such claims are not assignable, however. Only the entryman or his heirs may perfect the claim initiated before the withdrawal was made. Re-advertisements of timber and stone notices will be permitted the same as before the land was withdrawn from entry. But those who have contests in progress in the expectation of getting preference right to enter the land after cancellation of the contestee's entry will be disappointed. For what does a preference right amount to when no entries at all are permitted? On the same ground relinquishments in the withdrawn area will do their purchasers no good. The relinquishment carries the land back to the government and there it will stick because there is no way to get it out of the government so long as the withdrawal order continues in effect. The statutory right of commutation does not appear to be affected by the withdrawal order. In short, the withdrawal (it is not a reservation) serves only to stop new business, the transfer of unperfected claims and the prosecution of contests. The remainder of the land business can proceed precisely as if no withdrawal order had been issued. And it may be that the land will be restored to entry again in time for preference rights to attach under contests now in progress, though this is hardly to be counted on.

Those who are interested only in the lumbering developments in this region are prone to overlook the fact that we do not depend solely on our timber resources for our railroad prospects. Immediate lumber manufacturing on a large scale would undoubtedly bring the railroad; so might large mining activity or the cultivation of a popular health resort. But railroads go and thrive where none of these inducements are offered and Bend will have a railroad if never a saw-mill should be built here. Put 1000 thrifty families on irrigated lands here and see how long the railroad will stay away! More than that number may be established here in less than two years. The Pilot Butte Development Company will have water available for 20,000 acres and the Columbia Southern Irrigation Company will have 10,000 or more acres under ditch before the end of this year. There will be 60 acres each for 500 families, and a considerable part of that total is already contracted for. Next year the irrigated area will be more than doubled. The productive energy and consuming capacity of such a community as will occupy this land will make a commerce that the railroads will be mighty glad to cater to, regardless of the timber. The timber may bring us a boom, but for abiding stability we must rely on the cultivation of the soil. The growth may be a little slower but it will be immeasurably more substantial and lasting.

Another of McKinley's cabinet ministers is to give way. Secretary Root has resigned the war portfolio and he will be succeeded next January by Judge Taft, governor-general of the Philippines. General Wright, a life long democrat, will succeed Taft in the Philippines.
