### STOP LAND WITHDRAWAL.

First Question for New Debating Society Wednesday Night.

Steps to organize a literary and debating society were taken at a meeting for this purpose held at Grant's hall Wednesday evening. Arrangements were made for a full programme at the same place next Wednesday night, when a permanent organization will be effected.

The meeting was called to order by J. H. Overturf and a temporary organization made with J. M. Lawrence chairman and N. P. Weider secretary. A committee to draft constitution and by-laws for permanent organization was appointed, consisting of Mr. Overturf, Miss Iva West and Rolla C. Stone. A programme committee consisting of Miss F. McCann, Miss Maggie Aune and S. D. Percival, was appointed.

Mr. Overturf proposed the following resolution for the opening debate next Wednesday evening.

Resolved, that the orders withdrawing from entry lands of Oregon east of the Cascade mountains, with a view to creating forest reserves, should be rescinded.

The chair was directed to name the leaders for the debate, the leaders thus named to select their own assistants and the entire debate to be limited to 40 minutes. J. C. Meeker was appointed to lead the affirmative and J. H. Overturf the negative. Each will probably select two assistants.

Besides the debate there will be a varied programme of music and other numbers and general business, including the permanent organization of the society. All are invited to attend the meeting.
