They are getting things into a pretty mess down in Portland. The police service of the town was lax and certain citizens organized to improve it. They brought an action against the chief of police and other police authorities to compel them to do their duty. And now the supreme court has had the temerity to decide that the chief of police must do his duty, even to the extent of arresting notorious gamblers. If a chief of police is not to have the privilege of protecting his friends and harrasing his enemies where's the fun of being chief?

Mr. Newell's condemnation of Carey law reclamation enterprises as "more for selling stock and bonds than for watering lands" is too sweeping. It is a reckless generalization that an officer at the head of the irrigation service of the government ought not to be guilty of. Doubtless his characterization fits many of the irrigation projects—fits 'em like a mustard plaster. But will Mr. Newell please point to some field of human endeavor that has not its birds of prey, its parasites, its frauds? Even political science or scientific politics, has its blemishes. To judge the whole body by those defective members is not wise. There is no doubt that conscientious work for the reclamation of arid lands is being done under the Carey law, and, to be specific, it is being done right here in the Deschute country. Mr. Newell should visit the Deschutes valley and become informed.

Last Sunday the Bend postoffice was moved from the store of the Bend Mercantile Company to the store of the Bend Furniture Company. The stage office made the same change.

The postal department has made Bend a money order office, authorizing the inauguration of the service on August 15—next Monday. The necessary supplies have been received and the issuing of orders will then begin. A number of money orders from other offices have already been drawn on Bend and cashed here informally. Hereafter everything will be in regular order.

Postmaster A. H. Grant has purchased the lot on the west side of Wall street at the corner of Nevada opposite the Pilot Butte Inn and will erect there a one story frame building for the accommodation of the postoffice and stage station. It is a triangular lot and this building will occupy the corner point, leaving room for another business building on the lot.
