Henry Hedges journeyed down the river last week to look over the country and note the budding metropolis of that section. He came back to Bend, bought another lot and is preparing to erect another dwelling, having disposed of the cottage he first built.

An effort is being made to change the mail route between Rosland (Bogue's) and Odell so it will follow up the Deschutes instead of doubling a dozen miles on the Silver Lake route. This will serve a number of settlers who are now without convenient mail facilities.

Triplet Bros. made a ditch last Saturday, leading from the Pilot Butte company's ditch to their barber shop, to supply water for the bath room. This ditch is along the west side of Wall street for more than a block and the running water there suggests Salt Lake City.

Gist and family, near Sisters, stopped in town Wednesday night with the McKeynolds and are on their way home to Sonoma county, Cal. Mr. and Mrs. Cannon say their next trip to Oregon will be to see the Lewis and Clark Fair.

Dr. W. S. Nichol, who arrived last week from Oklahoma, has concluded to settle in Bend and practice his profession. His father-in-law, Dr. Chas. E. Coombs, will reach Bend in a few days and he also expects to practice medicine in this vicinity. Both will also take land and participate in the material development of the country.

Charles H. Haswell, of Seattle, accompanied W. E. Guerin, sr., and Gerald Groesbeck in from Portland Monday. Mr. Haswell has taken some of the D. I. & P. In accord with all up-to-date churches, the floor will be built on an incline to permit the audience an unobstructed view of the speaker in the pulpit.
