Here the Bend postoffice is bringing the government more than \$2000 a year net, ten times as much as all the rest of the country between Prineville and Lakeview; yet the department says the Bend mail schedule must be made to suit the Prineville tavern keepers, and has actually installed such a service. Bend does not have to and it will not tolerate the imposition.

Nearly 70 pupils are now enrolled in the Bend school and a dozen others are in sight. It is probable that Mrs. Overturf will be employed to teach the three primary grades, temporary quarters for which will be fitted up in Mutzig's hall. This will give the relief for which there is now urgent demand. Whether it will be necessary to employ still another teacher cannot now be foretold. At this writing it is expected to open the new department next Monday morning—if carpenters can be had to make the necessary desks.

### NO RECOURSE ON BOND.

The statutory bond given by justice of the peace does not cover cases like that of ex-Justice Brock, of Bend precinct, which was referred to in circuit court proceedings at Prineville last week. That bond is only for security of money that may come into the hands of the justice. Any delinquency other than financial is not reached by it.

There apparently being no cause of action on the bond, the only remedy would appear to be under section 1892 of the Bellinger and Cotton code, which provides as follows:

If any officer of this state, or of any county, town, or other municipal or public corporation therein, other than the governor, justice of the supreme court, or members of the legislature, shall willfully and knowingly charge, take or receive any fee or compensation, other than authorized or permitted by law, for any official service or duty performed by such officer, or shall willfully neglect or refuse to perform any duty or service pertaining to his office, with intent to injure or defraud any one, or shall willfully neglect or refuse to perform such duty or service to the injury of any one, or the manifest hindrance or obstruction of public justice or business, whether such injury, hindrance, or obstruction was particularly intended or not, such officer, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary not less than six months nor more than one year, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year, or by fine not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, or by dismissal from office with or without either of any of such punishments.

The supreme court has decided that where material matters were omitted from a justice's record the entry may be supplied by a nunc pro tunc order, but it is hardly probable that this remedy would be applicable after the justice's term has expired and the data from which to make the record is wholly missing.

### SHORT HISTORY OF OREGON.

There are histories and histories of Oregon, but where will one go for a comprehensive and trustworthy statement of the events out of which this commonwealth grew and of its progress as an independent community? There are books on the Oregon question, on Astoria, on the fur companies, on the Indian wars, etc., etc., but for an intelligent statement of all these matters it has remained for Miss Sidona V. Johnson to compile her "Short History of Oregon" which has just been published by A. C. McClurg & Co. The very first impression of it is favorable—it is a handy volume of 329 5x7 pages printed in type a little larger than this. It is well illustrated with maps and photographic views, all finely executed. It has an excellent index, and the contents are attractively arranged. To one who values accuracy of statement above piquancy of style this book is a great relief, because it makes the statements with candor and simplicity and leaves the special arguments for others. It is, as the author very frankly states, a compilation of Oregon history rather than the result of personal investigation of original sources, but there is enough original work in it to give it character and to stamp it as a book of high excellence. The Lewis and Clark renaissance has made a new demand for the facts of Oregon history and

the appearance of this volume is timely. It would be especially valuable in the public schools and the State Text-book Commission ought to adopt it. No entirely new writing, no matter how delightful in style or novel in plan for general reading, could compare with this careful and clear "Short History of Oregon" for use in the schools.
