Postmaster G. W. Wimer, of Tumalo, brings in some turnips about as big as the monster recently recorded for the Sisemore garden. And he has a lot of them. These turnips are of the variety known as the cowhorn and they grow without any trouble on Bull creek flat—grow to be a foot in diameter and of excellent texture and flavor for table use. These turnips had the benefit of irrigation. The Wimers are bringing a large body of fine land under irrigated agriculture.

A battery of 15 safety deposit boxes arrived this week for the Central Oregon Banking & Trust Company and have been installed in the big vault at the bank. These boxes are themselves fire and burglar proof, and they will also be kept in the stone vault. The customer has a key, which will not, however, open his box, so less of

his key will not affect the security of his box. The customer's key must be used in connection with the master key in the hands of the cashier before the safety deposit box can be opened. The master key alone will not do the work. A deposit of 50 cents is required when a key is taken, to be refunded when it is returned. These boxes rent for \$3 each a year and they are going fast.
