There is an opening at Bend for a good dentist.

That's a corking good word Leslie Scott has introduced into the Portland Oregonian's vocabulary—that adverb "eftsoons." Now if he will kill the fellow that passes "fore-casted" he can have his crown on demand.

The area proposed to be included in the municipal corporation of Bend is but little more than the town plat. From the southeast corner of the platted portion the lines run westward to the river taking the Rowlee dwelling in the city, thence passing down the west bank of the river to a point abreast of "Dad" West's present dwelling, then east to the West corner and, taking in the West residence, thence southward to close.

The active demand here for laborers and the remoteness of this field from the world's beaten paths tend to draw characters not in all cases to be desired. It behooves citizens to be on the watch for dangerous manifestations and to see that law is respected in the community. For this purpose every man is a peace officer. In this connection it might be pointed out that Bend ought to have a place for the safe keeping of prisoners and the suggestion that the county supply steel cages for such an institution, if Bend provides the building, ought to receive serious consideration.

The Bend mail schedule is restored to sanity by orders issued by Assistant Superintendent Vaile this week. Mr. Vaile writes The Bulletin that it was not designed to change the hours of schedule when the increased service to Silver Lake was inaugurated but that the mistake occurred through confusion of orders. He did not know of it until The Bulletin's statement of the case reached him, when he took immediate steps to correct the trouble. Since Prineville disavows any design to spoil the service in the interest of its hotels and the tangle is all brought straight by the new official orders, Bend has no desire to harbor a grudge and drops the matter without impugning anybody's motives. All's well that ends well.

The election results are in all respects notable. Roosevelt gets by far the largest plurality any presidential candidate ever got. The same reforms were also endorsed wherever the public got a chance to express its favor. La Follette was re-elected governor of Wisconsin, Deneen was chosen governor of Illinois and Folk governor of Missouri, though Missouri otherwise went republican—the first break in the solid south. Both democratic candidates lost their own states by surprising pluralities, and both republicans carried their own states. On lesson to be read in this election is that real reform in the public service finds popular support but the impracticable theories and pharisaic reforms of professional politicians and place hunters and sentimentalists are turned down with heat and dispatch. Locally it should be recorded that the respectable "Gas Adverts" again failed to accomplish his purpose in Delaware.

Two brothers named Wilson, who had been working on the D. I. & P. ditch, were arrested Tuesday by Deputy J. S. Smith and taken to Prineville, on a warrant from Prairie City, Grant county, charging them with horsestealing.

A. L. Stephens, of the Farewell Bend Hotel, is having the parlor, dining room, office and two bed rooms clothed and papered and the windows and doors cased. The place begins to look more like a hotel and will be much more comfortable and inviting to travelers.

J. B. Merrill, the Crooked river rancher near Forest's, J. Frank Stroud and H. E. Seehale, of Haystack, have taken over the new livery stable of Porter & Wright and will conduct it in the name of the Bend Livery & Transfer Company.

Mrs. J. O. Johnston and her mother, Mrs. Rowlee, and "Grandpa" Johnston left this morning expecting to meet J. O. Johnston at Biggs and go with him to Columbus to spend the holidays. It is not yet known whether General Manager Johnston will return to Bend before Christmas or not.

The Rev. Dr. G. M. Booth, of the M. E. church at Prineville, was in Bend Thursday evening and held services at the new Baptist church. After the services there was a short business meeting held and it was decided that the Methodists will hold services here one Sunday out of every month, details to be arranged hereafter.

O. C. Riches, postoffice inspector, came in from Portland Wednesday night and left yesterday noon to return. This week he made his annual inspection of a number of postoffices in Crook county, Bend being among them. He said that the Bend postoffice would be advanced to the presidential class next fall unless there should be a material falling off in the volume of business.

E. Nelson, graduate of the state agricultural college of Wyoming and who has been teaching there and engaged in special work for the department of agriculture several years, arrived in Bend last week, has taken land under the Pilot Butte canal and will engage in practical agriculture here. Incidentally he may do something in the way of experimental agriculture for the company.

J. P. Johnson Tuesday began construction of a two-story building 24x60 feet with 10-foot ceilings on both floors. It is situated on the east side of Wall street between Ohio and Minnesota streets. Mr. Johnson will have living rooms on the first floor at the rear, and the front will be made into a store. The second floor will be divided into lodging rooms. And it is probable that the Bend Magazine club will have one large room there for a reading room.

The Great Universal Jubilee.

Pope Pius X has issued a Universal Jubilee to the whole world in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the definition of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception, which feast will be celebrated on Dec. 8. The supreme pontiff has granted extraordinary indulgences and privileges in this Jubilee which will terminate with the most beautiful and imposing religious ceremonies. Rev. Father Hickey will visit Bend next week to give all his people an opportunity to make this grand Jubilee and their Christmas Duty as well. This genial and clever priest will be here on Thursday the 24th and will give a free lecture on Friday and Saturday evenings at 7:30 o'clock. He will celebrate mass and hear confessions on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock so that those at a distance may be able to attend. His subject for the Friday evening lecture will be "Indulgences and Superstitions." Saturday evening, "Can the priest forgive sins?" and "Is he bound therefore?" Father Hickey in his all his kind non-Catholic friends to attend and give these subjects their unprejudiced consideration.
