MORE THAN \$100,000

Building at Bend in Year Just Past.

THE FULL LIST PRESENTED

Shows General Growth of the Community to be both Substantial and Rapid.

The Bulletin is at some pains this week to present a list of the building improvements here in the past year. A few are in the adjoining townships of Deschutes and Lytle and a few others on nearby farms. The purpose in compiling the list is to give not only the improvements on the small townsite of Bend (where 75 per cent of it does belong, however) but those properly classified and broadly identified with the commercial community and locality of Bend. In other words, the name Bend is used in this connection not in a discriminative, but purely descriptive, sense. Following is the list:

Doubtless it will be found that in the haste of compilation some buildings have been omitted from the list. No attempts have been made to particularize for sums under \$50. Many sheds, porches, additions, outbuildings, etc., have been erected that will easily increase the total above stated by \$5,000.

Some of the buildings in the list are not yet fully completed. On the other hand, some that have been started are not enrolled. It is somewhat difficult to draw the line between the structures properly belonging in the year just closed and those falling in the coming year. Of necessity the line is largely arbitrary and the classification has been such as seemed to give the most accurate general view of the situation, without going into wearisome details or distorting the matter.

Improvement Company Organizes.

The Deschutes Improvement Co. organized Wednesday by choosing W. E. Guerin, jr., H. R. Lamb and G. C. Steinemann directors. The board chose as president Mr. Guerin, vice president Mr. Steinemann, secretary C. M. Weymouth, and manager Mr. Lamb. Mr. Weymouth was also made auditor. In a few days this company will open an office in Prineville for the sale of land. This will probably be in the Prineville Hotel, and Frank Gaudinier, until recently station agent at Sumpter, Oregon, will be in charge.

Foreman J. S. Ord has left the employ of the D. I. & P. Co. and started for Portland last Monday morning accompanied by several other men who have been working for the company. Among these were Timekeeper G. A. Jones, Camp Boss B. C. Algood, Ditch Foreman G. M. Pearce, Fred Asnar, and Robert McKennett, Watchman Joe Wolfe, Blacksmith Geo. Bantian and Charles Reuber and Fred Wolfe.

BEND IS NOW A CITY

Incorporation Approved by County Court.

ELECTION RESULT DECLARED

New Officers must Take Oath of Office next Tuesday and Enter Upon their Duties.

Bend is now a city. The boundaries are as heretofore published. The officers are required to qualify next Tuesday and enter upon their duties then.

The county court Wednesday canvassed the Bend municipal election and thereupon entered an ordering finding all notices legally given and the election in all respects regular, and officially declared the result. These matters are set forth with due formality in the court record. They are the same as have already been set forth in The Bulletin, no changes in the persons elected or the numbers of votes cast being noted.

The first officers hold only a year, except half of the council. After the first term the regular term of office will be two years. The first council meeting will be next Tuesday, when the bonds to be given by recorder, treasurer and marshal and the compensation of those officers will probably be fixed.

Telephones to Ranches.

The Deschutes Telephone Company is about to extend its line about 30 miles to serve the ranchers in territory south of Powell buttes. Half a dozen instruments will go on the line at the start. Most of the patrons of this circuit will be the purchasers of "ditch" lands. The line will pass out by way of the Zell place and it will have a full metallic circuit, requiring the use of about 60 miles of wire. Dry poles from some of the up-giver deadenings will be used.

Postoffice Business.

For the last quarter of 1904 the receipts of the Bend postoffice from stamp cancellations were \$447.06 and from box rents \$27.20. For October the cancellations were \$122.05, November \$152.51 and December \$173.30, which shows how the business here is growing.

Edward Kinney has applied to the United States civil service commission for an examination as irrigation engineer. On account of the remoteness of Bend the commission has asked Postmaster Grant to present the list of questions to the applicant and see that the rules for such examinations are observed. The examination will begin January 18 and continue two days.

The Rev. Father M. J. Hickey was in Bend this week and started a Catholic church organization. The plan is to build here an edifice which shall do like the Wasco church and a good start at raising the necessary funds has already been made.
