AN ORDINANCE

To protect the public health, to prevent the spreading of contagious, infectious and epidemic diseases, to provide for the appointment of a committee on health and to prescribe the duties of such committee.

Section 1. That the Mayor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a committee of three (3) members of the Common Council, to be known as the Committee on Health.

Section 2. The Committee on Health shall exercise general supervision over the health of the city, and enforce all measures necessary to promote the health and cleanliness thereof.

Section 3. The Committee on Health shall have the duty of inspecting and reporting on the sanitary condition of the city and the cleanliness thereof.

Section 4. In case of the death of any person within the city, it shall be the duty of the attending physician to notify the Health Officer.

Section 5. Whenever any person residing in the corporate limits of Bend, shall know that there exists within his place of residence, or in his family, any person afflicted with any contagious, infectious or epidemic disease, he shall immediately notify the Committee on Health.

Section 6. Every physician having knowledge of the existence of any case of contagious infectious or epidemic disease within Bend, shall immediately make report thereof to the Committee on Health or the Marshal, with such particulars as the case may require.

Section 7. The diseases referred to in the preceding sections shall include cholera, typhoid fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, and such other contagious infectious and epidemic diseases as the Committee on Health may from time to time decide to be of such character.

Section 8. Any person or physician who shall fail to comply with the provisions of sections 4, 5, 6, and 7 of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than two nor more than ten dollars for each day that he neglects to obey the knowledge thereof as aforesaid.

Section 9. Whenever the Committee on Health shall be informed of the existence of any of the diseases set out in section 7 within the corporate limits of Bend, it shall be its duty to immediately cause the same to be displayed in public places, so that it can be seen from the public street abutting on said premises, a yellow placard in case of cholera, a red placard in case of typhoid fever, a blue placard in case of measles, and a white placard in case of scarlet fever, and such placards to be at least twelve inches square, with the name of the disease plainly printed thereon. Said placard shall be owned and furnished by the City.

Section 10. The quarantine placed as defined in section 11 of this ordinance must be allowed to remain at least twenty days after scarlet fever and ten days after diphtheria, as reported, or such further time as the Committee on Health may designate, and such a length of time as the Committee on Health may deem necessary, and it shall be unlawful for any person to remove any person, or to in any way interfere with the quarantine, without permission from the Committee on Health.

Section 11. No person who is or has been afflicted with any of the diseases mentioned in section 7 shall be permitted to leave the premises on which he is confined, until he has been examined by the Committee on Health, and until he has been pronounced fit to do so.

Notifying the disease has passed, and no person residing or lodging in a house where such a disease is present shall attend school, church or other public place without permission from the Committee on Health.

AN ORDINANCE

Authorizing and empowering The Deschutes Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate a system of poles and wires and other apparatus and appliances necessary or convenient to the successful operation of its system of telephone and telegraph in the City of Bend, Oregon.

Section 1. That The Deschutes Telephone Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oregon, and its successors and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered to construct, maintain and operate a system of poles and wires and other apparatus and appliances necessary or convenient to the successful operation of its system of telephone and telegraph in the City of Bend, Oregon.

Section 2. All of said poles, wires, apparatus and appliances shall be constructed, operated and maintained that the same shall be no impediment to the ordinary use and occupation of such streets, avenues, alleys, highways and public grounds, and said company shall be held liable for the same.

Section 3. The City of Bend, Oregon, shall not be held liable for any injury that may be done to its poles, wires or other apparatus or appliances by reason of the breaking or severing of any pole, wire or other apparatus, or from the breaking of any gas or water pipe by reason of the change in any grade on any of the streets, avenues, alleys, highways or public grounds, or by reason of any other pole, wire or apparatus that may be done or made in said City.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor and legal publication, and the filing with the City Recorder of an acceptance of the terms of this ordinance by the said grantee herein, to-wit: The Deschutes Telephone Company.

AN ORDINANCE

To regulate the building of chimneys and to provide for the prevention of fire.

Section 1. Every chimney or flue, within the corporate limits of the City of Bend, shall be of brick or stone at least four inches in thickness, and be laid in good lime mortar.

Section 2. The members of the committee on Police, Fire and Liquor License and the Marshal shall have the right to enter and examine any building within the city, to discover violations of this ordinance, or to decide if such buildings heretofore built are sufficiently safe and secure, and if in the judgment of the Committee on Police, Fire and Liquor License, any such buildings shall be deemed unsafe, it shall be the duty of the occupant, owner or agent of the premises, notified of the fact, and order that the same shall be immediately repaired, and if the parties so instructed refuse to repair, they shall in addition to the fine imposed for violation of this ordinance be liable in the further sum of one dollar for each day such imperfect flue or chimney shall remain uncorrected, after notice shall have been given to repair same, as above stated.

Section 3. The provisions of this ordinance shall be held to apply for the owner, occupant or agent of every building which has heretofore been erected within the City of Bend, if after thirty days' notice by the Marshal to such owner, occupant or agent, all deficiencies shall not have been remedied.

Section 4. Any person or persons found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction before the Recorder shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred (100) dollars, or be imprisoned for any term not exceeding fifty days or for both fine and imprisonment.

Section 1.
