tion with other matter will corrupt or impair the quality of any well, spring, brook, creek, branch, or pond of water, which is used or may be used for domestic purposes, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor.

The next section is much more particular and comprehensive. Section 21.33 provides a penalty for any person who shall put, or the owner or owners who shall knowingly permit, "any part of the carcass of any dead animal into any river, pond, road, street, alley, lane, lot, field, meadow or common," etc.

ALFALFA AS A FORAGE.

No Other in the Arid West can Compare with it.

The feeding value of alfalfa is not always appreciated. Reports of bad effect from its use are often heard, and many on that account become prejudiced against it.

Alfalfa as a forage is very different from native hay or from rye, oats or barley hay, and should be classed with the clover, vetches and field peas.

It is well known fact that when green or improperly cured alfalfa may cause bloating and often with fatal results. Even the best alfalfa hay fed too liberally to stock unaccustomed to it may have the same effect.

Alfalfa is grown very extensively in many parts of the arid west and is fed successfully to all classes of stock. It is used in fattening rations for sheep and cattle and excellent pasturage for hogs.

In view of its great nutritive value and abundant yields some alfalfa should be grown on every farm where there is any land suitable to its cultivation.

AN ORDINANCE

Defining and providing for the punishment of disorderly conduct and certain other offenses. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bend:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to interfere with, molest, abuse, threaten or restrain any peace officer, or to refuse to assist him in the discharge of his duties, or by any means whatever to aid or assist any person in custody upon charge of a violation of a city ordinance, in his endeavor to escape from such custody, or to aid or assist any person to escape from such custody.

son or persons to hitch or fasten any animal to or otherwise destroy any growing or living shrub or other ornamental tree, or any case or box around such tree within the limits of the city of Bend.

Section 15. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or cause to be thrown or deposited upon any street, sidewalk, highway, alley or public grounds, or upon any private premises, or anywhere except at such places as are designated by the Committee on Health, any ashes, paper, manure, glass, metals, nails, broken ware, dirt, straw, hay, rubbish, garbage or other filth.

Section 16. It shall be unlawful for any person to enter the body of any deceased person in any lot, place or premises within the corporate limits of the city of Bend.

Section 17. It shall be unlawful for any person to build or assist in building bonfires within one hundred feet of any building within the corporate limits of the city of Bend.

Section 18. It shall be unlawful for any person to use the public sidewalks of the city for the purpose of packing or unpacking of goods or merchandise, or for the display of merchandise, or to leave any goods, merchandise, boxes, barrels, trunks or other articles upon any portion of the public streets, sidewalks, except while actually removing the same into or out of some building or enclosure, or loading the same into or out of some vehicle.

Section 19. It shall be unlawful for any person to play ball or throw any stones or other missiles, in any of the streets, highways or alleys of the city, or on any of the sidewalks of the city of Bend.

Section 20. It shall be unlawful for any person to place on any sidewalk, crosswalk, street or alley any article or thing whatever, except as provided in section 18, unless permitted to do so by the City Council, that would be liable to be blown or carried by the wind, and to cause the least obstruction to public travel, not to exceed twenty-four hours for such cord or load there of, and not to exceed eight days in the aggregate, the debris from the same to be removed from the street or alley by the owner of said wood, brush or debris, or by the City Council, immediately after the removal of said wood.

Section 21. It shall be unlawful for any person owning or occupying property on any street, highway or alley in said city, to allow said street, highway or alley to be unclean, and it is hereby made the duty of the marshal to notify such owner or occupant, when such uncleanliness exists, and on the failure of such owner or occupant to remove the nuisance, to have said street or alley cleaned at the expense of said property owner or occupant.

Section 22. It shall be unlawful for tenants, residents or householders, to allow slop or drain water to flow into any street, highway or alley of the city.

Section 23. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding two hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for any term not exceeding one hundred days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

AN ORDINANCE

Defining and punishing vagrancy. Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bend:

Section 1. The following persons are declared to be vagrants, and shall be subject to arrest and punished as in this ordinance provided, viz:

First. Every idle or dissolute person without visible means of support, or who has no lawful occupation, who has ability to work, but who does not seek, or refuse to seek employment, or labor, or refuses to labor when employment is offered.

Second. Every person who shall solicit alms as a business, or be found begging the means of support.

Third. Every person who habitually roams about from place to place without any lawful business.

Fourth. Every person having no lawful means of support who shall be found loitering around railway depots, street corners, crowded thoroughfares, places of amusement, or saloons or wandering about the public streets at late or unusual hours of the night.

Fifth. Every person found as known to be loitering in any bar, hotel, saloon, cafoona, unlicensed building, or place, without permission of the owner thereof.

Sixth. Every person who frequents or stays in or about houses of ill fame, or who habitually associates with common prostitutes.

Seventh. Every common prostitute or person found on the public streets, or at the windows of any house, soliciting prostitution.

Eighth. All persons who, being habitual drunkards, are destitute and without visible means of support, or being such habitual drunkards, shall abandon, neglect or refuse to aid in the support of their family and shall be complained of by such family, or by some responsible person known to such to be the fact.

Ninth. Every person enumerated and described in section 1 of this ordinance, shall be deemed a vagrant, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for not more than thirty days, or by both fine and imprisonment, and shall in addition pay the costs of prosecution.

Tenth. In all cases of prosecution under this ordinance, common fame shall be taken to be evidence in support of the complaint, and every house commonly known to be occupied or used for purposes of prostitution shall be taken and deemed to be a house of ill fame.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Marshal and all policemen or watchmen, either upon their own knowledge or belief, to arrest any person who is a vagrant as defined in section 1 of this ordinance, and bring him or her before the Recorder for trial.
