Postmaster Grant today commenced the erection of a 16x34-foot addition to the postoffice building. The general delivery window will be placed so as to face the east and move boxes will be installed. The partition where the general delivery window now is will be taken out and the door in the eastern part of the building will be used for entrance and exit of patrons of the office.

Gordon Dorrance was in town Monday when the Dorrance sawmill in 16-10. He says the mill will be ready for business by the first of April and it will saw more than 30,000 feet a day. A boiler 54 inches in diameter and 17 feet long will supply ample steam for 70 horsepower. The carriage will have steam feed. The plant will include gang edger, planer and shingle mill. The market will be the whole west desert.

So the engine rusted at Silver Lake until Steidl & Reed took it, and its log hauling virtues are now to be tested.

Both Get Their Reward.
Sheriff Smith received word the last of the week from Sheriff J. H. Smith, of Mendocino county, California, that William Lambert had been sentenced for life for the murder of Frank L. Drake. Lambert was arrested by Deputy Sheriff James Smith at Bend and brought to the county jail in this city last November where he was identified by Sheriff Smith as the man wanted in the California town and for whom a reward had been offered. The sheriff received vouchers along with the letter telling of the murderer's conviction, and as soon as these have been filled out and returned he will receive the sum of \$350, the reward offered, with \$100 additional given by the California county for his clever piece of work.—Prineville Journal.
