Frank May departed for Shaniko Wednesday, where he will represent the Deschutes Irrigation Co., among those coming into the country looking for land location. The change is in the nature of a promotion for Mr. May, whose services here in the same capacity have been most satisfactory to the company.

Mayor Goodwillie is expected to reach home early next week. Instead of coming directly home from Chicago he went down to Thomasville, Ga., for a short visit with the Drakes. The Drakes have taken a house there and will remain in Thomasville about two months, by which time it is expected Mrs. Drake will be strong enough to return north.

The Pilot Butte sawmill plant resumed cutting Monday morning, employing a force of forty men. Many improvements have been made about the mill during the shut down other than doubling the driving power, in the way of arranging automatic sawdust feed to the boilers and in the construction of new tramways, facilitating the handling of the lumber.

At a meeting of the Bend Cornet band Monday evening the resignation of C. N. Smith, as director, was accepted, and C. A. Riddle elected to that position. A renewed interest is being taken by the members and diligent practice is the plan accepted for the next few months. The money accumulating in the treasury will be added to, and a first-class set of new instruments will probably be ordered to be on hand for the 4th of July. Later uniforms will be purchased.

SEVEN TIMES A WEEK,
Bend Will Get Mail Every Day Hereafter.

Almost before delivery of the letters denying the petition recently sent in to Washington for a daily mail service, order for the service petitioned for arrived from Washington. It makes the service between Bend and Prineville daily, instead of six times a week as heretofore. The new service goes into effect March 28.

The new order mixes the Silver Lake service again. The seven days service does not extend south of Bend. Silver Lake does not send a mail north on Sunday morning, which accords with the present absence of service out of Bend Monday morning. But the new order provides for a mail to go north from Bend at 2 o'clock Tuesday morning, instead of Monday, the vacant day. The hour is arrived at by reckoning the average hourly speed between Silver Lake and Prineville. That would make the time for passing Bend 2 a. m. But the road north of Bend is always good and mail can be delivered in Prineville on schedule time when the stage leaves Bend at 6 instead of 2 a. m. The mistake as to the date for the extra trip from Bend will doubtless be corrected before the change takes effect.

F. W. Vaile, assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, came in Saturday night and left Sunday morning. His mission this time was to examine the direct route between Bend and Heister with reference to having the Bend mail transferred over that route. Mr. Vaile did not seem much impressed with the expediency of the route asked for. The petition included Madras on this route, and Mr. Vaile thinks Madras would be as far off the direct line at the north end as Prineville is at the south end. There is a route more direct than either—via Lamona, and Culver, but that involves objectionable features in the service of side lines.

Upon the installation of the automobile service it is probable that mail will be transported over the direct route at a material saving in time and possibly a saving in cost also.

Last Wednesday a new mail schedule went into effect between Bend and Tumalo. Hereafter this mail will leave Bend on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 8 a. m. and leave Tumalo at 11:15 a. m. on the same days.
