AN ORDINANCE

Providing for licensing and regulating the carrying on of certain professions, trades, callings, and occupations within the corporate limits of Bend.

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall be engaged in, prosecute, or carry on any trade, business or profession within the limits of the city of Bend, Oregon, unless he or they shall have obtained such a license as is herein provided.

Section 2. Every license taken out under or by virtue of this ordinance shall be valid and in full force for the purpose, trade, business or profession for which said license is granted, and the name and place of abode of the person or persons taking out the same, shall be recorded in the office of the City Recorder.

Section 3. If any person shall furnish such evidence as shall satisfy the Mayor that he or she, by reason of misfortune or physical infirmity, merits exemption from the payment of any license herein required, the Mayor may grant such license for a period of not more than six months, and shall give every person a written permit, stating why such permit is granted, a copy of which shall be filed with the City Recorder.

Section 4. Astrologers, moonshiners, seers and fortune tellers shall pay a license fee of two dollars per day or ten dollars per week.

Section 5. Peddlers shall be classified and rated as follows: Wholesale travel with one animal, first class when traveling with one animal, second class when traveling with two animals, third class when traveling with three animals.

Section 6. Every person conducting a business in the city of Bend, Oregon, shall pay a license fee of five dollars per day or ten dollars per week.
