AN ORDINANCE
Providing for licensing, and regulating the carrying on of certain professions, trades, callings and occupations within the corporate limits of the City of Bend.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bend:

Section 1. No person, firm, company or corporation shall be engaged in, prosecute, or carry on, any business or profession within the limits of the City of Bend, for which a license may be required by this ordinance, until he or they shall have obtained such a license.

A person, firm, company or corporation shall be licensed to do business in this ordinance specified, without having first purchased a license so to do, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction before the Recorder shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$100, and shall be imprisoned for a term not exceeding fifty days, or may be punished by both fine and imprisonment, and the amount of such license shall be deemed a debt to the City of Bend and such person, firm, company or corporation shall be liable to pay to the City of Bend for the amount of such license.

Section 2. Every license taken under or by virtue of this ordinance shall contain and set forth the purpose, trade, business or profession for which said license is granted and the name and address of the person or persons holding the same. Said license shall authorize the continuance of the business named therein at the place named therein for the term of such license.

Section 3. Any person exercising or carrying on any trade, calling or occupation for which a license is required, shall on demand of any city officer produce such license and unless he does so, shall be deemed to have no license and shall be liable to arrest, fine and imprisonment as provided in section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 4. Every license issued, as quarterly license shall expire the last day of each quarter, six, 30 day of March, 30 day of June, 30 day of September, and 30 day of December; but the first quarterly license issued to any person, agent, or employee of such person, shall be valid for the month of the month in which the liability therefor accrued, and shall be issued upon the payment of a suitable proportion of the whole amount of duty imposed for such license.

Section 5. All licenses required by this ordinance shall be paid in advance (in gold or silver) in the amount of \$100.

Section 6. If any person shall furnish such evidence as shall satisfy the Mayor that he or she, by reason of infirmity or physical disability, meets exempt from the payment of any duty, except such as may be required by this ordinance, the Mayor may remit such license for a period of not longer than one day and shall give said person a written permit, stating why such person is granted, a copy of which shall be filed with the city Recorder, before such person shall be considered as exempt.

Section 7. Astronomers, surveyors, seers and fortune tellers shall pay a license fee of two dollars per day or ten dollars per week.

Section 8. Auctioneers shall pay license fee of three dollars per day, or twenty dollars per week.

Section 9. All persons shall be deemed an auctioneer who shall do business as an auctioneer within the meaning of this ordinance whose business it is to offer property for sale at public outcry.

The provisions of this section, however, shall not apply to auctioneers executing officers making sales, or to public sales by executors or administrators of estates of people dying in Bend, or of residents of Bend, settling out their household goods and furniture.

Section 10. Horsemen shall pay a license fee of five dollars per day, each and every person who shall offer any article for sale from a stand or wagon upon any street, public or open ground within the limits of the city, shall be deemed a hawkerman and shall pay a license fee of one dollar per day or ten dollars per week.

Section 11. Persons dealing in horses, mares, geldings or stallions, when traveling with two or more animals, first class, when traveling with one animal, second class, when traveling on foot, third class. Peddlers of the first class shall pay a license fee of ten dollars per week, or one dollar per day, peddlers of the second class shall pay a license fee of three dollars per week, or one dollar per day, peddlers of the third class shall pay a license fee of one dollar per week, or one dollar per day.

Any person, except persons peddling newspapers, dried fruit, dried vegetables, and farmers raising, peeling or curing the products of their own farms, gardens or milk ranches, (except otherwise excepted in this ordinance) who offer to sell at retail dried goods, seeds, vegetables or other comestibles while traveling, shall pay a license fee of one dollar per day, and be deemed a hawkerman.

Section 12. Every person conducting a billiard, bagatelle or pool table, except such as are used in private houses or private rooms, shall pay for each and every table a license fee of two dollars per day or twenty dollars per week.

Every person engaged in conducting a shooting gallery shall pay a license fee of ten dollars per quarter, every place or building where guns or pistols are kept for shooting at targets, whether or not used, shall be considered a shooting gallery.

Every pawnbroker shall pay a license fee of three dollars per quarter.

Every second-hand dealer shall pay a license fee of three dollars per quarter.

Every junk dealer shall pay a license fee of three dollars per quarter.

Every person exhibiting a pachinko shall pay a license fee of ten dollars per week.

Every patent medicine peddler or vendor, using money or letters to attract customers, shall pay a license fee of five dollars per day or fifteen dollars per week. All other patent medicine peddlers or vendors, two, two and one-half dollars per day.

Every person acting as artist, agent or carriage, or who solicits for patients, recommends or for any other purpose, any description of, or who induces his friends or sells books, albums or maps, shall pay a license fee of five dollars per week, or ten dollars per day, except persons advertising babies in newspapers and magazines and reading room girls.

Every person who shall sell or contract to sell any goods, wares, chattels or merchandise, by mail or order, for him or for any other person, or upon commission, shall pay a license fee of \$2.00 per day, or ten dollars per week.

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
